Woman Elected to School Board

Women's Library club, vice-president of the Rebekah State Assembly and will be president next year. Previous to her election in May she served as Grand Warden of this order.

The board of directors of the Klamath Falls public schools give as reasons for the purchase of a new site that the present site and building are now too small to accommodate the pupils in attendance, both as to playground and as to school rooms; that the present site is unsuited for the purpose because of danger to pupils from the large number of automobiles constantly passing on Main street; that the lot will be too valuable for business purposes when the city grows, as they believe it will, for the district to continue its use; that the present time is a good one to buy a new site, because prices are not exorbitant, available sites can be procured now which could not be had at a later date without condemnation proceedings; that sites which can be bought now will contain fewer buildings than if purchased later, thus affecting a material saving.

They also express the opinion that two whole blocks should be purchased to permit the construction of a modern building and still leave ample room for an inside court and outside playgrounds; believing that a district which expends so much money each year for its schools cannot afford to be niggardly in the matter of grounds.

They do not propose to offer the present building and site for sale at present, nor until there is an opportunity to sell for a good figure; that no sale will be made until the people have been fully informed as to price and the proposed use to which the ground will be put.

If the people authorize the purchase of a new site when the matter is referred to a vote, they propose to build only enough to care for the overflow from the present building, and not to build at all if any house on the ground purchased can be fitted up at small cost to answer the purpose until the old building and site can be sold.

The matter will be referred to the people as soon as one or more offers for a double block or for two blocks are received, but offers of two blocks should be for those contiguous to each other.

It is proposed to submit the matter to the people in such a way that they can express their preference for the purchase of only one block or two, or for no purchase at all, and their preference for one of the sites proposed. No site will be considered by the board if any director is known to have any personal interest in it or in its sale.

tries, etc., are exploited at an enormous expense.

Winning the grand prize on horticultural display was a big feather in Oregon's cap, but since then "feathers" of this type have been coming along so fast that the cap needs must be changed to a war bonnet to accommodate these prized plumes.

One of the big prizes striven for by all of the Western states in these days of high prices for cattle, hogs and livestock of all kinds is for forage crops. In this Oregon also won the grand prize. Klamath county's forage crops have carried off many medals and ribbons in competition with the rest of the state and with other coast sections, and this award on forage crops is one, which if properly exploited by Klamath county people, should be the means of attracting the attention of many desirable stockmen and dairymen.

Another award in which Klamath county people should be interested is the taking of gold medals by Oregon on quantity, quality and purity of fresh commercial milk entered at the milk competition. In view of Klamath's entrance into the dairying field, this Oregon reputation for the best milk for market, butter and cheese making, medicinal and other uses, is also of real value.

Besides the grand prize on forage crops, Oregon's agricultural exhibits are still winning. Thus far three medals of honor, twenty-four gold medals, sixty-nine silver medals and eighty bronze medals have been taken for agriculture, and horticultural awards to date are at least a score of medals.
