THAT LAVA BED ROAD

THAT Lava Bed road is of more importance to the people of Klamath county than they realize. There are but two routes from the north to the south through the state, east of the Cascades through Central Oregon, and west through the Willamette Valley, over the Siskiyou and on south. For a while when we failed to get the Pacific highway, it looked as if we were to be left out. But the opening of the Lava Bed road to Lookout and the excellent road to Crater Lake solves the question, and puts us once more on the main line of the "gas wagon"—if we go after it and see first that the road is there and then follow it up with advertising.

Crater Lake has been acknowledged for some time past to be the greatest individual wonder in the country. We have had some trouble claiming it from Medford, despite the fact that it is in our county, but then we cannot blame them. Now we can open up another wonder or wonders that will place within easy reach of the tourist a novel and exceptional opportunity to visit a real lava beds right on the main route of travel. Of course, they will get out of their machines to see the caves and wonders, but that is about all. Out of a sweltering sun into a dark, cold ice cave that perhaps is not surpassed in its class. Down onto the second level, stepping off from a ladder onto a frozen river, with the eddies, falls, gushing springs frozen into a most beautiful and awful silence that awes one while in its presence.

Aside from the several caves, including Ice caves, Bear's Paw cave, a very recent volcano, beautiful view of Tule Lake, crevices, caverns, blow holes, rock blown tunnels and many other oddities and freaks from nature there are on the other side of the beds the historic points about which have been woven a story of a fight for life. A wooden cross marks the spot where General Canby and his faithful followers were massacred. The retreat of Captain Jack, and many other notable spots which have played their part in the settlement and history of this country that few of us today know much about. As a matter of fact, the Lava Beds have not been explored to any great extent, and it is possible that wonders surpassing those which have been discovered are yet to be found.

The presence of the ice cave, perhaps the greatest at present, has been discovered only within five or six years, and who knows but that others exist. The country is full of new sights and things of interest. A hole in the ground to the bottom of which nobody has ever been. Such are a few of the things that might interest the traveling public.

The solution has been provided us to swing the traveling public through this country from both the Pacific highway and the Central Oregon highway.

We have a supply of lake ice on hand that was cut from the west side of Upper Klamath Lake, with a view of securing as pure lake ice as possible which we sell at 50 cents per hundred in small quantities, delivered.
