"AMERICANIZATION DAY!"

What does it mean?
Not in a moment of idle thought, but with every atom of gray matter that is within our power to focus upon it.

It means first, that every American born citizen should and ought to be standing up for the best interest of this country with every ounce of energy and sound judgment that he can muster together. He should not be making idle statements regarding the policy of our government, either in derision or in a poor attempt at being humorous. Our future is hanging in the balance.

Second, it means that every person who has been made a citizen of this country by the grace of God and the liberal mindedness of Uncle Sam, no matter of what nationality or of what clime, should conduct himself in the same manner of thought, and should be thinking constantly that this is his country, and the thoughts of a native land should be coursing through secondary channels.

Thirdly and lastly, it should mean that every person residing in this country who intends to remain here any length of time, should make haste to apply, if he has not already, for credentials and papers which proclaim him to the world as being a fit subject of the greatest nation on the face of the globe. It is not right that he should remain in this country and receive the benefits derived by the hard work, intense interest and gray hairs of its citizens. He should not remain an outsider, causing dissension and strife. It is his duty as a resident to give support to the country which furnishes him with bread. It may be true that he is having a hard time getting that bread—but so are a good many of the rest of us who were born here.

No matter what conditions exist in our national affairs, our business world or our social conditions, his path of duty lies straight before him. This country is yet new. It is yet unsettled. It is yet to attain that stability and sound basis that many of the nations now embroiled in the most heartless, cruel and unprecedented struggle that has ever blazoned the face of this old earth, claimed a year ago.

The opportunity lies straight and open before the people of this nation. We have created and are creating by our policy, despite criticism from all sides, by both the Germans and the allies, an atmosphere of stability, of good sense, and of sound judgment that will in time to come be recognized and respected by every nation on the earth. The Monroe Doctrine has been torn and shorn in the past of every bit of prestige and respect by certain elements, but nevertheless, the impression that it created, both in this country and abroad, is today showing itself, and probably is in no small way responsible for our neutral position. We are not to interfere in the broils of the eastern hemisphere, and no foreign nation is to interfere in the affairs of the western hemisphere, is the gist of that doctrine.

We have been criticized for not interfering in the so-called breaking of the neutrality of Belgium. Who broke it first? Germany or England? The people of this nation would like to be informed reliably on that subject. So far each contends that the other did, and from the general appearance it looks from here as if both did, with the French in on the side. Why did we not interfere in the Lusitania affair, to come down to more recent history? "All is fair in love and war" has been a byword in the past. Today it is a stern reality that must be recognized so far as the war is concerned. Germany is fighting for her life, and under no conditions that recognize so-called international law. Both the Germans and the allies have violated neutrality laws and the laws of humanity, without a doubt. What

Modoc County After
the Lava Bed Road

The following letter has just been received from the president of the Good Roads Association of Modoc county with regard to the Lava Beds road, by Captain O. C. Applegate:

"Our boys returned from the trip to Bear Foot Cave last night, and report a very pleasant meeting with yourself and delegation at that place yesterday.

"On behalf of the Good Roads Association of Lookout, I wish to thank you for your interest and enthusiasm in the matter of completing this road of scenic wonders from Klamath Falls to Lookout, and assure you that we are with you in this enterprise, as well as any other to our common interest, and that we are also boosting for the Pit River highway, which will bring us within direct communication with the outside world.

"With the Pit River Canyon, Bassett Hot Springs, Modoc Lava Beds, Klamath Falls and Crater Lake, we certainly have the most attractive route in the states of California and Oregon, and with good roads through this section we will surely make the people take notice. We also get a fine view of Mount Lassen from many points on this route.

"We will meet a Sacramento Valley delegation at Bieber tomorrow in the interest of the Pit River route, and while the Lava Beds road is a side issue to this project, which does not reach us directly, we are working both routes, and expect, by establishing a good road with the natural attractions to Klamath Falls, to turn a large percentage of the travel that way.

"With kindest regards, and again thanking you for your co-operation." The Pit River road to which Mr. Walker refers will connect the great interior region east of the Sierras with the Sacramento Valley by the most direct route, and by the best grade, and hence will add greater values to the Lava Beds road, since it will afford an easy and direct auto road to California from the Klamath country through a region of historic interest and scenic wonders.

In the meantime interest is widely aroused both north and south of the Lava Bed region in the prompt construction of the proposed road. The Modoc county people will begin construction immediately after the 4th, with the hope of completing their portion of the road by August 1st to the

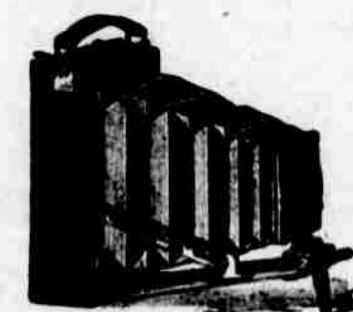
