**\$20,000 a Year Is Not Enough**

Little John Jacob Astor, posthumous son of John Jacob Astor, who went down on the Titanic, leaving a fortune of about \$70,000,000, most of which went to his son Vincent, by his first wife, cannot live on \$20,000 a year, according to his mother, the second Mrs. Astor.

She has just filed a statement in the surrogate's court, New York, in which the statement is made that that sum, which he now enjoys, is not sufficient. After giving the date of her appointment at November 13, 1912, the widow says she received no money from the son's estate until December 31, 1913, and that the setting of his allowance at \$20,000 a year took place on August 5, 1914.

"The necessary expenditures since the birth of the infant to December 31, 1914," she reports, "for professional services rendered the said infant by physicians and lawyers, and for my bond as general guardian, all paid by me, have been upward of \$3,000. From an examination of the accounts of various merchants and others with whom I have dealt I find

that there has been expended for clothing, supplies, toys, etc., for the use of said infant since the date of his birth to December 31, 1914, and paid by me a sum upward of \$5,000. I have not charged the infant with any portion of the rent paid by me for my summer home at Bar Harbor, Me., or of the cost of various trips on which he has accompanied me; or of the cost of the upkeep of automobiles maintained by me, from all of which he has received substantial benefit, and with a reasonable portion of which expense as I am advised by my counsel, Hon. Henry A. Gildersleeve, the said infant might properly be charged.

"From this it would seem that the expenditures I have incurred for the benefit of my said infant are far in excess of the moneys received by me."

**PAPERS SHOULD BE BOOSTERS**

"I believe in the efficiency of newspaper advertising because I have seen what it can do in such a variety of lines, covering such a divergence of propositions that the possibility of luck or accident must be eliminated from consideration."

It is the paper which publishes the true news that pays the advertiser best, the speaker said.

"Generally speaking, the best newspaper is the one which secures the best advertising," said Mr. Finn. "And the best advertising is what helps it to be the best newspaper. Truth is the slogan of this convention. Truth is the slogan of the newspaper that hopes to win the most lasting success—the widest influence. I have seen almost overnight newspaper advertising and merchandising successes that would have been deemed incredible ten years ago. And these successes were solid—they stayed put."

"Undoubtedly the greatest thing that newspapers can do for advertisers—for the business world, for humanity—is to spread the gospel of optimism, to chart a straight course of confidence. A newspaper that deals in unquieting rumors, that dispenses gloom, and that is always on the hair-trigger of uncertainty, defeats the advertiser and defeats itself."

"It is the truth that good times and bad are each largely a matter of psychology. In this respect the power of the newspaper is almost beyond reckoning. Boost and keep on boosting."

# Klamath Project Should Be Completed Say Reps

PORTLAND, June 25.—Little hope for the speedy development under government aid of the reclamation projects in Central Oregon was held out to the Oregon senators and representatives and other members of the Chamber of Commerce delegation when it presented the needs and the claims of this state before the congressional appropriations committee recently.

It is all a question of finance. What the committee saw at the Klamath project convinced it of the beneficial results of irrigation. Representative Mondell of Wyoming was enthusiastic over the results of the \$2,000,000 investment there. But when it is considered that the government is now receiving barely \$2,500,000 per year from the sale of federal lands and that changes in the land laws and departmental rulings have made it more difficult for homesteaders to enter upon such land, Mr. Mondell declared the outlook not bright.

"There is no disposition on the part of the committee to check the development of the West," said Mr. Mondell, "but if the income is less than the demand, the interior department must forego new enterprises or else all projects must be scaled."

Perhaps nothing has so emphasized the intense interest of the whole state in reclamation projects east of the Cascade Mountains as the action of the Portland Chamber of Commerce in sending a representative delegation of Oregonians to board the Congressional train when it arrived at Grants Pass yesterday to impress the appropriations committee of Congress with the great needs of the arid belt.

Where an air of lethargy prevailed, because of the committee having viewed project after project while en route west, until a more or less mechanical manner of looking at things had been acquired, the committee reached Portland with a keen interest in Oregon and a comprehensive knowledge of what the government can do through the appropriations committee to make the sagebrush of the Eastern and the Central Oregon country give way to fields of alfalfa, and to change the habitat of the jack-rabbit to communities of prosperous homes.

All day the Portlanders poured information into the ears of the members of the committee, and it was of a character that would be borne in mind. Ex-Governor West briefly reviewed the history of reclamation in Oregon and pointed out that of the 750,000 acres of land which it was originally desired to irrigate by Government aid, but 350,000 were now withdrawn for such purposes. He showed the part that Oregon had played in furnishing money from the sale of public lands and where it had been applied to the reclamation of lands in other states. Chairman Fitzgerald then interjected the remark that the appropriations committee was beginning the hand-

ling of funds for reclamation purposes with the idea that no state was "entitled" to anything. His situation was that it would be the policy of the committee to handle every appropriation upon its merits.

About twenty-five projects require for completion from \$5,000,000 to \$6,000,000. Estimates made February 25th showed that \$61,000,000 was necessary to complete these.

Estimated receipts from all available sources up to June 30, 1916, will be about \$14,834,000.

Congress appropriated both for construction and maintenance about \$13,530,000, of which about \$9,000,000 was for construction.

In other words, although about \$52,000,000 is necessary to complete irrigation projects, not a dollar is available.

Available funds for the future will be in receipt from land sales and the repayment by settlers on the construction of existing projects, about \$3,500,000 per year, unless other funds are provided and the returns from service greater than the amount thus to be relied upon.

Under the act of June 25, 1910, creating a fund of \$20,000,000 after five years after date of the first advance, November, 1915, 50 per cent of all receipts of the reclamation fund must go to the repayment into that fund of the amount advanced.

In consequence, unless there be further provision, the outlook for the speedy completion of further irrigation projects is not bright, and the opportunity for money to be put into new projects is so remote as to be negligible.

It was pointed out to the Oregon committee that the only solution is to provide new funds from some source, either state or private.

Mr. Mondell further declared that the Klamath project should be finished as soon as possible as a business proposition. He said:

"The government has \$2,000,000 invested down there. We must get it back. We never will unless the project is completed. And that means that another \$2,000,000 will have to be supplied."

He cited the Umatilla project and the Klamath project as the only two live projects undertaken by the government in Oregon. That others are of equal necessity was shown, he said, by the surveys conducted in Central Oregon jointly by state and reclamation service.

"Of the 60,000,000 acres in Oregon 30,000,000 are thus withdrawn," he said. "Oregon is larger in area than New York and Pennsylvania combined. Imagine what would happen, gentlemen, in the East, if half your land were suddenly removed from taxation, thus throwing the burden upon the remaining half."

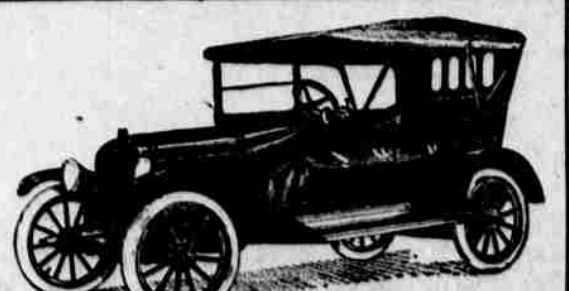
