PORTLAND LETTER

PORTLAND, June 28.—The cattle market for last week was steady to weak, with fair receipts. Ten loads of Mexican steers brought \$7.00, one load of Hereford-Shorthorn steers sold at \$7.40. In general quality stuff was conspicuous by its absence. Cows were quoted at from \$5.75 to \$6.25.

With a good run of hogs, the market opened at \$7.85 for top stuff, going down 10c toward the end of the week. Bulk of sales, \$7.75.

In the sheep house buyers were still forcing mutton prices down. Receipts of sheep were light, with good quality stuff. Choice lambs were quoted at \$7.15, ewes at \$4.75 and wethers at \$5.50.

WOULD MAKE EXPOSURE CRIME

MEASURE BEING FORMED TO MAKE IT A PENITENTIARY OFFENSE TO EXPOSE AN EX-CON VICT

PORTLAND, June 28.—A bill will be introduced in the next legislature seeking to make it a misdemeanor for anyone to disclose that a man or woman has served time in a penal institution, according to statements made recently by Joseph Keller, state parole officer. Mr. Keller outlined the operation and plans for the future before members of the Oregon Prisoners' Aid society in regular quarterly session.

He said paroled prisoners must have definite promise of employment before they are released from Salem in the future. He said this would prevent an ex-convict from finding himself penniless and without a job, and be a protection against lapses. To assist this plan, Mr. Keller said he had canvassed employers of labor in Portland and asked their cooperation, which was readily promised.

He stated that the state board of control, governor and penitentiary officials were acting in harmony in promoting improvements, chief of which were more effective educational features.

Ben Selling, M. G. Winstock and W. G. MacLaren were appointed a committee to wait upon the county commissioners and circuit judges for the purpose of urging the need of a parole officer for Multnomah county. Its size and a large number of paroled men from the penitentiary and jails who seek employment here are held to make the creation of such an office necessary.

Two other committees were appointed, one to wait upon the sheriff with the purpose of arranging religious and educational classes in the county jail and one to select delegates to the National Prison Congress which meets in Oakland, Cal., in September.

Slayton Still Has Troubles

APPROACH OF 4TH REVIVES ANTIQUE

The near approach of Independence day reminded Mrs. Wesley Hosmer of Eugene, Ore., of an old newspaper in her possession containing an odd notice of a celebration of the day in Boston in 1806. The newspaper is the "Independent Chronicle" of June 30 of that year, and printed in Boston. The notice printed reads as follows:

AMERICAN INDEPENDENCE
The Committee Appointed by the Republicans at the Last Anniversary of American Independence

Give Notice:—
That this glorious fra. will be celebrated on Friday next, on Copp's Hill (North End), by those republicans who formerly assembled at fanuall hall.

As their old rendezvous is pre-empted by the federalists, the entertainment will be made within a decorated tent, erected on the ruins of the battlements of the British troops, raised in the times which "tried men's souls," to annoy the sons of freedom on the heights of Charlestown.

The American standard will be hoisted thereon at sunrise; with a salute by the artillery.

Tickets ready for delivery by Dr. Noyes.

Those who are desirous to give a display of their patriotism on the great principle of American independence are invited, and no others. The tradesmen and every other class of citizens are respectfully requested to give in their names as early as possible, that the number to be provided for may be known by the committee.

N. B.—The Declaration of Independence will be read before dinner.
