LIBERTY BELL TO MAKE TRIP

CONSIDERED A MOST PRECIOUS SHIPMENT—EXTREME CAUTION IS USED—THROUGH TO SAN FRANCISCO BY JULY 15TH

Probably the most precious shipment ever handled by the railroads of the United States is the Liberty Bell, which will come across the continent next month for exhibition at the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco and the cities and towns en route. Elaborate precautions will be taken to insure the safe transportation of the priceless relic.

The bell will be handled on a special train. It will be under guard every moment from the time it leaves Philadelphia until it is returned there. It will be carried on a special gondola freight car, equipped with all the safety appliances necessary to enable it to be moved in a passenger train. The gondola will occupy the same position as an observation car, at the rear of the train, that the residents of the cities and towns through which it passes may view the bell. There are six other cars—sleepers, diners, etc.—these to be occupied by the exposition dignitaries, Philadelphia officials and others making up the escort committee of sixty or seventy persons.

The bell will leave Philadelphia on July 7th. Safety of transportation and the population of the country traversed by the railroads determined the routing. It will pass through Chicago and Kansas City, and thence be transported to Omaha, where it will be taken in charge by the Union Pacific. The latter road will carry it through Denver and Salt Lake City to Ogden, where the Oregon Short Line will assume charge, and take it to Boise. From Boise it will go via Eastern Oregon to Spokane and Puget Sound, thence to Portland. After being on exhibition in this city for six hours July 15th until noon, the Southern Pacific will become its guardian, taking the bell and its escorting party toward San Francisco. It will reach Salem at 2 o'clock, remaining half an hour; arriving at Eugene at 5 o'clock and leaving 15 minutes later. The bell will be at Roseburg from 8:15 until 8:30, leaving then for San Francisco. July 17th will be Liberty Bell Day at the exposition.

main building, where the fish are allowed to grow strong preparatory to distribution. C. F. Stone suggested that a dam be placed in the river, which he estimated could be done at a cost of \$500, for the purpose of running the trout up this stream. Governor Withycombe, chairman of the commission, expressed himself as heartily in favor of the dam, as did Mrs. Jack of Pendleton.

The commission was taken to the Spencer Creek hatchery in automobiles by local sportsmen, leaving the White Pelican hotel at 9 o'clock. On the return they left the hatchery at 12 o'clock, coming back by the old stage road by Chase's station to this city.

A public reception was tendered the Governor and the members of the commission at the White Pelican hotel last night, at which several hundred people of the city were present. The Governor made a few remarks, speaking of the importance of patriotism and loyalty to our country and government at this time, and also of the possibilities of the Klamath country. The reception was in charge of the Woman's Library Club of this city.

Saturday night, following the arrival of the party in the city a banquet at which seventy-five local sportsmen and members of the Chamber of Commerce were present to honor the visitors, and to present to them the situation here in regard to fish and game and also the wants and needs of the country. E. B. Hall acted as toastmaster and Dr. E. D. Johnson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, explained the purpose of the meeting.

I. N. Fleischner of the commission brought a message from the Portland Commercial Club, stating that though they were unable to send a man here for the Governor's visit, that the club is behind Klamath Falls in her efforts to get better transportation facilities. Every member of the commission stated that they would co-operate and work to keep the Klamath country the true "sportsmen's paradise," as it is known.

Governor Withycombe spoke favorably of the reputation that the country and its sportsmen are getting by creating a spirit of every sport his own game warden.

Early this morning the party left for the Upper Lake, where they got aboard a launch owned by Captain J. W. Siemens of this city, to be taken to Harriman Lodge. There they were met by a party consisting of Chas. Roberts, Chas. Moore Jr. and W. O. Smith, who went around the lake by machine, and who will convey the party to Crater Lake. Lunch was had at Harriman Lodge.

At Crater Lake they are the guests of Superintendent Steele and Mr. Parkhurst, and will be taken tomorrow after spending the night at the lake, to Medford by a delegation from the Medford Commercial Club, after which they will return to Salem by rail.

NEW SISKIYOU CONTRACTS LET

HIGHWAY OVER MOUNTAINS TO BE PAVED WITH CONCRETE—CONTRACTS ARE AWARDED TO BIDDERS

MEDFORD, June 24.—State Highway Engineer Lewis has awarded contracts to the Portland Cement Corporation of San Francisco for about 5,000 barrels of cement, and to the Medford construction company for about 10,000 cubic yards of crushed rock, to be used in concrete paving on the Siskiyou mountain division of the Pacific highway, by day labor, under the direct supervision of the state engineer.

This pavement will be eight feet wide on the hill side of the road in excavation, with an additional eight feet adjoining the paving of crushed rock roadbed, which will take care of the heavy summer travel.

The highway commission also contemplates surfacing with crushed rock all soft places on the Pacific highway from Steinman to the California line, and eventually, as money is available, the concrete will be laid for entire distance. The rock on the hill side of the road eventually may be utilized for a base for further hard surfacing. The contract calls for about 5,000 barrels of cement at \$2.51 a barrel, and an allowance of 10 cents per sack. The contract price for crushed rock ranges between \$1.73 and \$1.85 a cubic yard.

To Ice Customers:

My attention has been called to a statement in a recent issue of the Herald by Mr. Campbell of the Klamath Valley Warehouse and Forwarding company in regard to the tests made by Dr. Calvin S. White of the State Board of Health, of the manufactured and the natural ice from samples sent him by Dr. Truax, city health officer of this city. Mr. Campbell states that no samples of his ice has been taken by Dr. Truax. While I was not with Dr. Truax on either occasion when he took the samples, yet I have full confidence in his integrity and judgment, and am quite sure that he took fair samples from both Mr. Campbell and ourselves. Mr. Campbell also states that the natural ice he has taken from the west side of the lake, while that of the independent company was taken from the east side, which is practically correct. We, however, were careful to go far out into the lake, where there is always running water, while on the opposite side, where his was taken, is a bay, where there is no current at any time, and where dead fish, etc., would naturally gather if there were any, which, however, is quite improbable during the ice harvesting season.

When we went into the ice business here we had heard a good deal of knocking of the natural ice, and we wanted to know just how it stood as to purity, etc., compared with the manufactured product. Therefore, we had Dr. Truax take samples of both, and send to the state board of health for analyses, and the result was exactly as printed in the Herald. If Mr. Campbell or anyone else questions the authority or correctness of the tests they can call on Dr. Truax, who will verify them. Or, better still, have him take other samples and have them tested, as we still have lots of the same ice, and Mr. Campbell, I think, is still making some of the manufactured ice.

More statements from Mr. Campbell or ourselves as to the purity or quality of our ice are not very satisfying to the public, but an analysis of the article must be correct.

Mr. Campbell states again that his ice is made from the city water, which statement we do not question, but we recall that samples of the city water in the past have shown great impurity, and in the process of manufacture we can not see how the manufactured ice can be better than the water from which it is made, being frozen in tanks, while on the other hand, we are told by scientific men that ice freezing in the open forces the impurities out as it freezes, just as when a bottle of ink freezes the foreign matter is forced to the bottom, leaving the top practically clear.

We are also told that ice will purify itself within six months. This ice of ours has been stored for six months, so must be practically pure now.

We quite agree with Mr. Campbell that the people of this city should look to the purity of its water and ice, and should further use only the purest, and to that end we shall insist on the health authorities making tests of the ice from time to time as the summer advances and impurities increase.

We ask for ourselves and the public a fair shake, and shall insist that we have it.
