WHAT THE WAR MOVES MEAN

NEW YORK, June 30.—Indications of immense additions to the British navy since the outbreak of the war are contained in the supplementary naval estimates introduced into parliament, calling for 50,000 additional men. This is an increase of one-third over the navy's personnel at the beginning of the war.

One year ago the navy included 450,000 men, including those occupying shore posts, admiralty office employees, dockyard and naval station men. The recent additions have been made almost entirely for sea service.

Just how many warships have been added to the British navy since the outbreak of the war is unknown except in official circles. But it is known that from 750 to 900 men are being used to operate the newest super-dreadnoughts.

England was building ten super-dreadnoughts at the outbreak of the war. Two battleships for Turkey were also in the process of construction. These were taken over by England and Turkey was compensated accordingly. Parliament has approved the building of four other dreadnoughts of the latest design. It is believed that England today has sixteen super-dreadnoughts ready for action.

Beside rushing work on the building of dreadnoughts, the British admiralty is hurrying the construction of light cruisers to replace those sunk by the Germans. New destroyers are also being built, intended to replace vessels lost in the sea fighting.

It is whispered in official circles in England that Great Britain since the outbreak of the war has built up a supplementary fleet almost as powerful as that of the entire American navy.

WORTHY PRIZES GO TO OREGON

OREGON BUILDING, Exposition Grounds, San Francisco, June 30.—Grand prize for the "best, most complete and most attractive" exhibit in horticulture, together with a score of gold and silver medals for individual exhibits in horticulture, the grand prize for the "best general display of forage products," including all unthreshed grain, together with three medals of honor, twenty-four gold medals, sixty-nine silver medals and eighty-nine bronze medals for various products of the soil! How is that for one week's awards for Oregon?

From the noise being made by the six or eight states in direct competition, the Oregon winners ought to be satisfactory to Oregonians. Oregon fruit is now officially recognized as the best, and Oregon forage products will become as favorably known as the Oregon rose.

Oregonians on the exposition grounds are particularly pleased that the state captured the grand prize on forage crops. While Oregonians know that general farming represents the larger portion of the wealth of the state, and that the state is unequalled in the production of superior forage and grains, the apple and pear booster, more active than the rest, has made Oregon known most largely as a premier horticultural state. The magnificent showing in the Palace of Horticulture has made a tremendous impression and in winning the grand prize has brought Oregon's larger side to the attention of the nation, which will now know that Oregon can raise hogs, feed dairy animals and beat the world in other things than fruit. This is particularly gratifying to O. E. Freytag of Oregon City, who is director of agricultural exhibits.

"Bill" Hanley, Oregon's biggest rancher, who operates one little corner of over 200,000 acres in Harney county, was here a day or so ago, and said the exposition has finally placed Oregon where she ought to be among the farming states, and he is as delighted with her success as any proud father could be of an only son.

It is worthy of note that the medals of honor, which are one degree above gold medals, went to Eastern Oregon, Willamette Valley and Southern Oregon exhibits with equal honors.

On Saturday the Columbia River highway exhibit won a medal of honor as showing the best roadway engineering, the greatest scenic beauty and the best method of advertising.

ENGLAND AND U. S. CELEBRATE

ON WASHINGTON BOUNDARY LINE—OREGON INCLUDED BECAUSE IT ONCE INCLUDED ALL OF THAT TERRITORY

PORTLAND, June 30.—In commemoration of the one hundredth anniversary of the declaration of peace between the United States and Great Britain there will be a patriotic celebration July 4th on the international boundary line at Blaine, Wash. The celebration will be on the Pacific highway under the auspices of the Pacific Highway Association, and will be participated in by prominent persons representing both national and foreign governments, state divisions and provincial districts. Several Portlanders will participate in the celebration. The program includes the raising of the Stars and Stripes and the union jack on separate staffs, and music by British and American bands. Archbishop Alexander Christie will deliver the invocation. Addresses will be made by representatives of the governors of the Pacific Coast states and Arizona. Sir Richard McBride, premier of the Dominion of Canada; Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper of Vancouver, B. C., and the Rev. M. A. Matthews of Seattle will speak. The mayor of Blaine will speak the first welcome, and mayors of other cities in the Pacific Northwest will make short talks.

Representing Governor Withycombe of Oregon, Frank Branch Riley of Portland will present and raise the American flag. This honor is accorded to this state because of the fact that what is now the state of Washington was originally part of Oregon. The British flag will be presented and unfurled by A. E. Todd of Victoria.

An arch of peace, clothed in masses of flowers will symbolize the good will between the two countries. British Columbia and all Canada and the United States.

Among those who will go from Portland are Samuel Hill, president of the Pacific Highway Association; Henry L. Bowley, the association's executive officer, and K. Kumasaki, Japanese consul, who will represent his government.

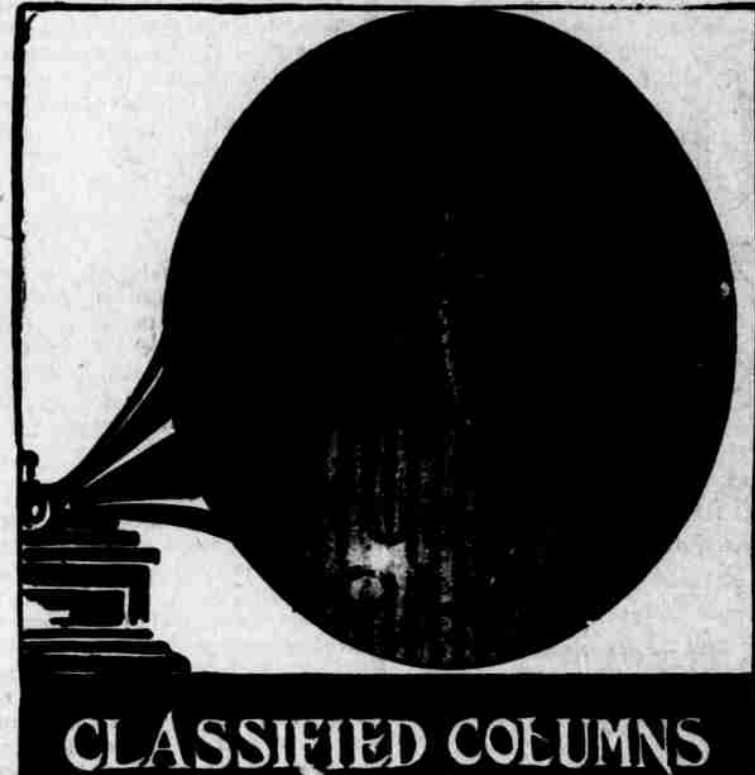
