AMERICANIZATION DAY

JULY 4, 1915, in one sense of the word has been given a new meaning, and is being celebrated in a new manner, at least different from that of the past few years. In that special emphasis has been laid this year on bringing out the idea of Americanization Day.

Looked at from a 1776 viewpoint, however, if we could go back to that date, we would find that the spirit displayed by the people of this nation then was similar to the idea that has been imbued in the minds of American citizens today.

While a few years ago the Fourth of July had become demoralized into a riotous, noisy and even dangerous to life and limb celebration, yet within the past few years the people of this nation have come to realize that it was becoming demoralized, and that this date was not being celebrated by the children of our forefathers as it should be, or as was fitting the memories of that date.

The people of the nation are realizing more than ever this year the necessity for a day to be one of less boisterousness and celebration, and one for thought, for community gatherings, patriotic addresses, flag exercises and a closer getting together of the manifold interests as represented by the citizens of our nation.

To foster these ideals some of the greatest and most prominent personages of our nation formed a league and appointed a national committee to draw up a program, which was sent broadcast over the land for the information and enlightenment of all. Following is a program they drew up in the fostering of the ideal of making July 4th a real American Day:

Requesting cities to have citizenship receptions as part of the regular Fourth of July exercises, invitations to be sent to new citizens officially and through the school children on Flag Day, upon which occasion the advantages of citizenship, learning English and civics and participating more fully in American life will be emphasized.

Neighborhood meetings in the communities where no celebration is to be held, at which American employers or neighbors will be hosts. This will be especially helpful in labor colonies, camps and other isolated communities remote from cities.

GOOD REBATE ON LICENSES

SUM OF \$14.10 IS RECEIVED BACK AS REBATE TO COUNTY CLERK UNDER NEW STATE LAW NOW IN EFFECT

The sum of \$14.10 is to be received by the county clerk's office due to the rebate on hunting and fishing licenses issued during the month of June, under the new law providing a 5 per cent rebate passed by the last legislature, and which went into effect May 23d.

Angling licenses issued during the past month far exceed the others, and are expected to do so until the fall hunting season opens, there having been 248 issued. Sixteen hunting licenses were issued and 29 combination licenses. The total cash received was \$257.31 being the fee for either hunting and fishing licenses and \$2 for combination licenses.

Owing to the unusual large number of visitors and tourists which are expected to be here this year for the purpose of enjoying the "true hunters' paradise," a number of deputy clerks have been appointed who may issue licenses. Percy Chambers will issue licenses at the Gun Store in this city for those desiring to get them after hours, Harry Eagle at Port Klamath, and W. L. Moore at Chiloquin. This month a big increase in number of fishing licenses is expected, as the travel is commencing.

ANGLO-AMERICAN CONTROVERSY ON

QUESTION OF WHETHER SHIP WAS A TRANSPORT OR A FREIGHTER CAUSING ANGLO-AMERICAN CONTROVERSY

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The sinking of the Armenia is likely to cause an Anglo-American controversy over the question whether she was a transport or a freighter. Officials agree that if the boat was a transport she should not have been permitted to load and clear the port. If the acts of the Armenians were of an unneutral nature, the same is true.

It is stated here that so far as Germany is concerned the incident is considered closed. It is understood that Germany's note on the Lusitania incident awaits the Kaiser's final approval and is expected to arrive here the first of the week.
