LEG PARALYZED

him.LIBERTY BELL
CAR IS TESTEDEXTREME CARE BEING USED
THAT THE FAMOUS OLD LIBER-
TY BELL WILL NOT BE INJUR-
ED ON TRIPPHILADELPHIA, July 5.—Prelim-
inary tests of the specially built steel
flat car on which the liberty bell
will be transported across the contin-
ent to the California expositions
were completed today. Traveling at
the rate of 55 miles per hour over a
new work of switches in a local freight
yard, a glass filled with water was
placed on the floor of the car and
not a drop was spilled.The car is of all steel construc-
tion, capable of carrying a weight of
more than 100,000 pounds. An elec-
tric generator installed beneath the
platform, operated by an axle, will
charge the batteries for the hun-
dreds of incandescent lamps with
which the bell will be illuminated at
night on the journey.Cone Johnson, solicitor of the state
department, has been designated by
President Wilson as the orator for
the Fourth of July Independence
Square celebration which will be pre-
ceded by the departure of the historic
relic.FIRE CHIEF IS
NEARLY KILLEDIN RINGING ALARM SATURDAY,
ON ACCOUNT OF DEFECTIVE
FIRE ALARM SYSTEM—LOTS
OF SMOKE, NO FIREA reported fire in the garage and
wagon shop at the corner of Sixth
street and Oak avenue, which was the
cause of much excitement Saturday
morning, which turned into wonder,

to fall he let loose of the hammer,
which he was holding above him, but
caught it as it went by, went on up

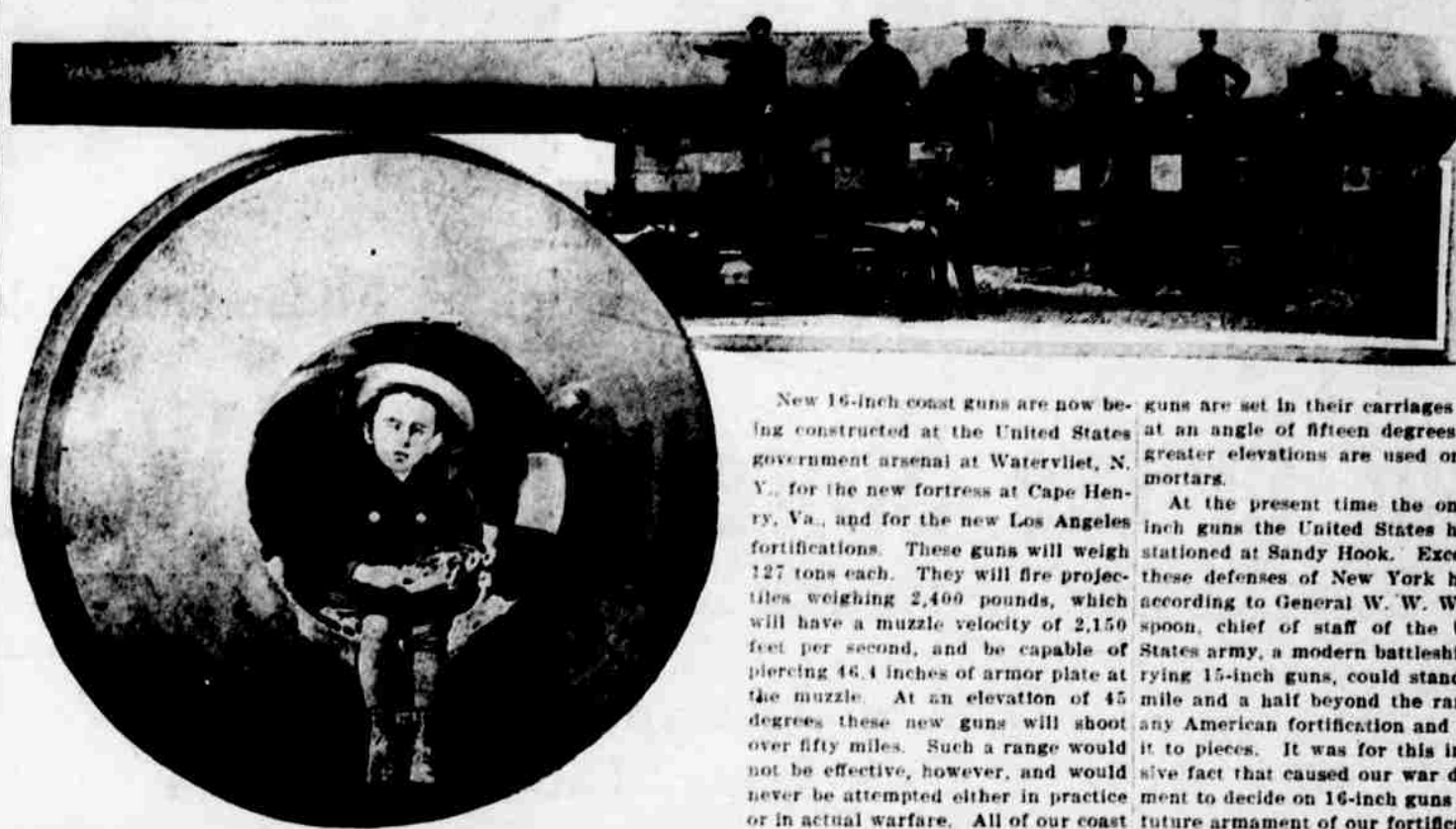

What a Sixteen-Inch Gun Really Looks Like

New 16-inch coast guns are now be-
ing constructed at the United States
government arsenal at Watervliet, N.
Y., for the new fortress at Cape Hen-
ry, Va., and for the new Los Angeles
fortifications. These guns will weigh
127 tons each. They will fire projec-
tiles weighing 2,400 pounds, which
will have a muzzle velocity of 2,150
feet per second, and be capable of
piercing 16.4 inches of armor plate at
the muzzle. At an elevation of 45
degrees these new guns will shoot
over fifty miles. Such a range would
not be effective, however, and would
never be attempted either in practice
or in actual warfare. All of our coast
guns are set in their carriages to fire
at an angle of fifteen degrees. The
greater elevations are used only for
mortars.
