Canadian Scores Morgan Contract

Returning to the United States with a contract for \$83,000,000 of war supplies for the Russian government, Wilson W. Butler, vice president and contracting engineer of the Canadian Steel companies, limited, and the Canadian Car and Foundry company, limited, said he had told the British authorities that their contract with J. P. Morgan & Company of New York for the purchase of war supplies, was unjust.

"I went to England," said Mr. Butler, "to appear before the Booth committee, which is to devise means of defense in co-operation with the war office. The British war office wants to import skilled labor from Canada

and other colonies. I got very sore over it. I said to the committee: 'We don't see why you want to take our labor away. I consider this desire to import Canadian labor an outrage.'

We Canadian manufacturers are indignant that Morgan & Co. have not given us any of these orders. I personally have eight factories that are idle. Lloyd George is up against the stiffest proposition of his life, and if he wants to get the best possible results from Canada he could do no better than appoint Sir Thomas Shaughnessy as his agent. Everybody in Canada has complete confidence in Sir Thomas. He was purchasing agent before he became president of the Canadian Pacific railroad, and as such was the most efficient man in Canada. If Canada is properly handled she can produce shells on an infinitely greater scale than the British government is aware of. The great demand is for an explosive shell. Shrapnel can't tear up a concrete backed trench, an explosive shell can. The whole trouble with the munitions question over there is the red tape of the British office."

Mr. Butler said he went to Petrograd and obtained an order for 5,000,000 shells, the largest order ever given out by the Russian war office. He was in Russia from February 15 to April 1. The cost of Russia's contract it \$83,000,000.

PLANS BEING MADE FOR HOLD-
ING OF UNIQUE INITIATION ON
WIZARD ISLAND—MANY COME
FROM THE EAST

L. R. Stimson of Salem, Grand Keeper of Seals and Records for the Knights of Pythias, is visiting Medford in the interest of the convocation to be held at Crater Lake in August. He predicts that Medford will be crowded with visiting Pythians who are coming from all parts of the country to witness the novel spectacle.

"Travel facilities to Crater Lake will be taxed to their utmost," said Mr. Stimson, "for Pythians from all over the country I have received word that parties of from five to twenty are coming clear from eastern states by autos while almost every section of Oregon and many portions of California will be represented."

"Elaborate preparations are being made by the lodge. Superintendent Steel of the Crater Lake park has received authority to expend \$100 in the construction of a new trail that will be safe for horses, that will land Pythians on the shore of the lake opposite Wizard Island, which will enable those attending to ride to the waters edge, and shorten the distance to cross the lake.

From all sources comes inquiry regarding the meeting, and Crater Lake will be widely advertised by it."

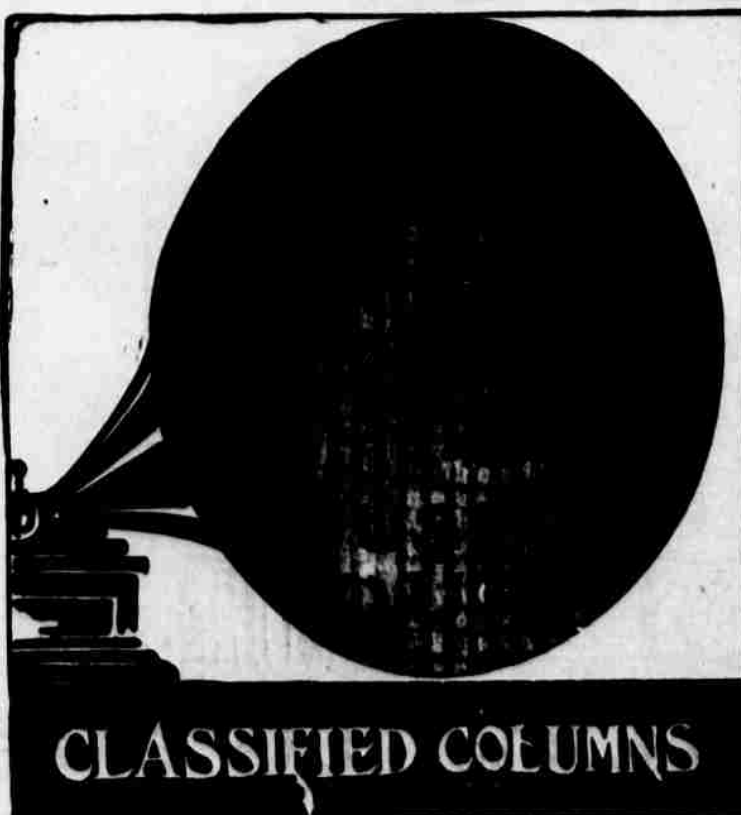
