What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, July 6.—For the first time since the allies began their campaign on the Gallipoli peninsula it is possible to say that a decisive victory leading to the opening of the Dardanelles may not be indefinitely delayed. The allies have succeeded in advancing half of the way along the peninsula in the direction of the nearest fortification guarding the narrow. The attacking armies have learned the value of concentration, and see now that the original method of scattered and broken attack was a mistake. The result shows that Sir Ian Hamilton, the British commander, possesses strategic ability of the highest order.

After seizing Southern Gallipoli April 25, the English armies gained two miles in two days, when they were halted by the Turks. By the middle of May, when the allies changed their methods of attack, the Turkish resistance has gradually given way. Besides a number of minor attacks the allies have made three successful major offensives, May 19, June 4 and 5, and the last one, which will be concluded this week. Four more miles have been covered.

In less than ten weeks six miles have been won. This is the best progress that the Anglo-French forces have made since the battle of the Marne. That the fall of Constantinople is a possibility and even a probability within a comparatively short time is evident.
