A CALL FOR VOLUNTEERS

A CALL for volunteers to work a few days on the Lava Bed road has been made. Every man in the city ought to be anxious to make the trip in the automobile that is to be provided. That road means hard dollars and cents to this city and county, and many of them.

Governor Withycombe's advice when in this city a short time ago—"Get the tourist, the hunter and fisherman into your city and country, if but for a few days. Many of them will stop here, and eat your food, but if they do not they will see your country and its possibilities, and it means that you will benefit."

The opening yesterday of the Columbia River highway, when fifteen Portland autoists traversed one of the most scenic routes in the state, is most significant at this time. It is being advertised as opening a road from California to Yellowstone Park, and there is no reason in the world why Klamath county and Klamath Falls cannot be on that road and catch a majority of the travelers.

There is no doubt in the world that in Crater Lake and the Lava Beds we have two of the greatest and the one greatest scenic wonder in the state or on the coast, and by giving the travelers over both the Pacific and Central Oregon highways good roads to these points, they will be glad to make the trip. Today many are making the trip, and it is largely a side trip, but such a road, giving an outlet to California, means a through road.

The coming of the advisory board of the state highway commission next week means much to this county, and they should be made fully cognizant of this proposed road. Coming from the northern end of the state, they will be boosters for the Columbia River highway by birth, and the movement to shoot the travel through this section should be started as soon as possible. By proper advertising in Portland and San Francisco and way points, there is no doubt but that we will secure these tourists.

**VON JARGOW SAYS
CAN SELL TO ALLIES**

JANE ADDAMS REPORTS INTERVIEW SHE HAD WITH GERMAN FOREIGN MINISTER—ADMITS RIGHT TO SELL MUNITIONS

NEW YORK, July 7.—"Foreign Minister von Jagow of Germany told me personally that he believed the United States was acting within its rights in selling munitions to the Allies, but that it was creating a strong anti-American sentiment throughout the German empire," Jane Addams, delegate to the women's world peace congress at The Hague, made this statement today on the American liner St. Louis. Miss Addams said von Jagow made this admission when he was presented with resolutions from the congress pleading for peace.

"We saw the prime ministers of England, Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, and in every instance were warmly received," said Miss Addams. "Every courtesy was paid us and attention was given to our plea for peace."

"Through Cardinal Gasparri we were granted an audience with his holiness the pope. I was with him an hour. He said that he knew that the women's peace congress had already done much toward bringing about peace. His holiness congratulated the women on the stand they have taken and the attempts they have made to end the war. He assured them the vatican was always ready to do all in its power to bring peace to the warring nations, but added that he believed little could be done now."

Miss Addams said that in her travels she found two distinct parties in each of the countries involved in the war. Between them she observed a constant, bitter struggle to obtain control of the government.

"The military party insists that the war be continued until victory is theirs; the civil party demands control of the government and immediate peace," she said.

Fears Harry Thaw Will Harm Her

Mrs. Harry Thaw, wife of the man who is again making a strong legal effort to escape incarceration in the Matteawan asylum as a lunatic, has been found hiding in a bungalow in the far northern part of New York state, while the trial of her husband is going on in New York city. This photograph is the latest taken of her and her young son, Russell, who is with her in her seclusion.

The deputy attorney general of New York, who is trying the case against Thaw, made efforts to find the wife, that he might place her on the stand as a witness against her husband. However, newspapermen found her long before the state's officials even learned where she was. They discovered she is so near the Canadian border that she can easily cross and escape a process server, should she desire to do so.

Mrs. Thaw, it is claimed, is in fear of her husband. She believes he will do her bodily harm should he be liberated. She says all his efforts will be directed to have her leave the state, and says her life will "be a hell on earth if he ever gets out."

**CRIES OF MEN
TO END THE WAR**

STATES WIFE OF NOTED ENGLISH LABOR LEADER—"THE CRIES OF THE WOUNDED MEN FOR THEIR MOTHERS"

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—"A noted British military leader told me that it was not the sight of the dead, the terrible carnage, or the dreadful desolation of the war, some that sickened him and caused him to lie awake nights, but it was the cries of wounded men for their mothers."

This is what Mrs. Ethel Snowden, wife of Philip Snowden, noted labor leader and member of the British parliament, told peace advocates in session here.

"It is this," Mrs. Snowden declared, "that is going to end the present war and all future war. It is the mothers of the world, who, when they are allowed to vote will not allow their sons, husbands and fathers to be slaughtered, for what?—to settle difficulties between nations that ought to be settled by men of sufficient calibre without killing."

**FOURTH COSTS 8
DEAD, 177 HURT**

CHICAGO TRIBUNE FIGURES SHOW A CONSIDERABLE DECREASE IN NUMBER OF INJURED OVER 1914

CHICAGO, July 7.—Eight persons were killed and 177 injured as a result of Fourth of July celebrations throughout the nation, according to figures compiled by the Chicago Tribune. In 1914 the total number of victims was nine killed and 601 injured.

The fire loss due to accidents combined with the use of explosives was \$66,550, as compared to the loss of \$76,035 last year.

Persons injured were victims of various kinds of noise-making instruments. The causes of injuries were: fireworks, 60; cannon, 12; firearms, 19; gunpowder, 25; torpedoes, 14; toy pistols, 26; runaways, 8; bomb canes, 3.

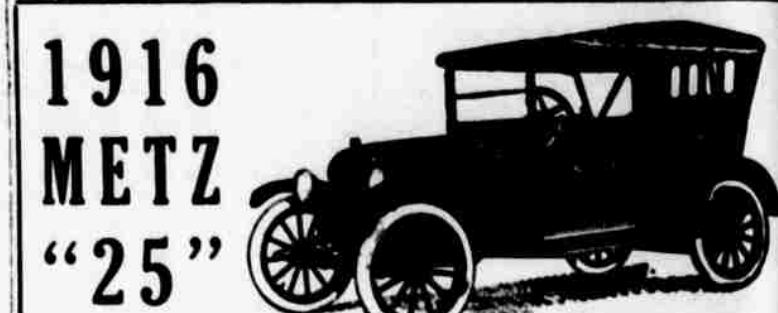

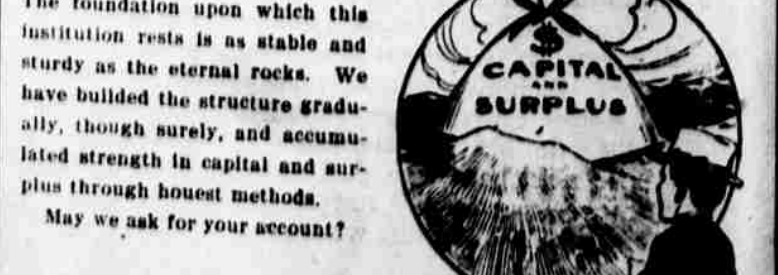
