## BLIND GIRL SEES MOTHER FIRST TIME

COLLEGE CO-ED RECOVERS HER  
SIGHT THROUGH OPERATION.  
AND HAS STRANGE SENSATIONS NOW

LOS ANGELES, July 8.—Miss Tomayne Carlisle, the 21-year-old Berkeley student, born blind, whose eyes have just been opened by a surgical operation, saw her mother for the first time today. She arrived here aboard the steamer Bear from San Francisco, and was met at the gangplank by her mother, Mrs. E. R. Carlisle of Pasadena. The greeting was pathetic.

The girl slowly walked down the plank, as though some of the uncertainty of blindness still affected her. She looked at the crowd with a puzzled expression. Then the mother stepped eagerly forward. They met. Whatever they said was whispered. No bystander heard it.

Entering an automobile they were hurried to Los Angeles and thence to Pasadena. In Los Angeles, Miss Carlisle met friends she had known intimately for years. They were all strangers to her until they spoke. Then she recognized their voices.

Quantities of flowers were given her at the residence of a friend in Los Angeles. She expressed renewed wonderment at the appearance of the blossoms, and looked with wonder at

the crowded streets as her auto slowly proceeded through them.

"So this is Los Angeles," she said, "almost my own city. Yet there is nothing familiar about it except the noises."

## What the War Moves Mean

Germany's new objective in the East is revealing itself as a drive against Warsaw from the south, coupled with the isolation in Southern Russia of the Slavs, who are being forced from Galicia.

This double intention was the purpose of the offensive in August. It failed then, and success is not certain now. General von Linsingen is pushing the Slavs through Eastern Galicia toward the Russian border. Once over their own frontier they will be prevented from relieving Warsaw by a direct route because of the extensive marshes in Southern Poland. Between these marshes and the Vistula, Field Marshal von Mackensen is operating. The only way the Russians defeated in Galicia can attack von Mackensen's forces is along the narrow plain running from Galician frontier, northeast of the marshes. This gateway must be closed by von Mackensen, and he is closing it with his right wing.

The rest of von Mackensen's army is moving toward Ivangorod, the only fortified center on the Vistula south of Warsaw, which is without fortification. The Polish capital is defended by a field army in two entrenched camps along the Vistula. One is Novogeorgievsk, twenty miles northwest and the other is Ivangorod, fifty miles to the south. Field Marshal von Hindenburg tried to capture Warsaw from Novogeorgievsk and failed. He also tried to subdue Ivangorod from every direction except that which von Mackensen is taking. The effort of Field Marshal von Mackensen is, therefore, the final hope of the Germans.
