SAM'S BOOST IS "KNOCK"

SAM EVANS' most recent outbreak, in which he used his hammer on the successful Fourth of July celebration, accusing those in charge of not fulfilling their promises, is creating a great deal of amusement for the newspaper men of the state. They recall some promises Sam made to the State Editorial Association last fall, which the executive board of the association is now certain will not be fulfilled.

When Oregon's newspaper men met in Oregon City in October, Evans was very much in evidence with speeches, and with a most alluring invitation that the newspaper men come to Klamath this summer for their next meeting. He promised them that they could hold their sessions at the beautiful and famous Harriman Lodge, "far from the maddening crowd," surrounded by a sylvan Elysium which has for its boundary a wonderful lake teeming with Rainbow trout of leviathan proportions, whose only sound is a whispered invitation for editors to pull them out of the limpid depths with a hook, line and rod.

But this was by no means all. Evans had still more effective inducement—there would be no expense at all for the newspaper men to pay once they hit Klamath Falls. They and their wives would be handled and fêted about with automobile trips, yellow-legged chicken dinners, while at the conclusion of their trip they would be taken to Crater Lake without so much as a spark plug bill, and taken from there to Medford and again fêted by Medfordites at the same expense.

Just before Evans made his speech, Ben Sheldon, in behalf of the Medford Commercial Club, invited the Editorial Association to Medford, promising good entertainment and a trip to Crater Lake. Sheldon is not a newspaper man, and left after delivering his invitation. Sam immediately extended his invitation, and this was accepted in preference to the Medford offer.

Sam's enthusiasm, according to officials of the Press Association, lasted at least until he returned to Klamath Falls. As soon as they began to write him regarding details necessary for the convention, and which should be arranged in advance, they found that Sam's enthusiasm had ebbed to such an extent that he did not deem it essential for him to answer the letters they wrote him. Klamath county newspaper people will also bear witness that while they assured Evans that they would be glad to do all in their power for the success of the convention and the entertainment of the visiting writers, they have not as yet been advised in any manner regarding plans, etc.

The result of the Evans flash-in-the-pan has been to put Klamath in an but an enviable light before the newspaper men of the state. Unable to get any response from Evans regarding details for the meeting, which was tentatively set for next month, E. E. Brodie of the Oregon City Enterprise, president of the association, in disgust, has cancelled the Klamath Falls meeting, and has announced that it will be held in whatever city extends an invitation to the association.

Corvallis and Medford are both making plans to invite the meeting, which would have been held at Klamath Falls but for Evans' neglect or laziness.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, July 12.—General Botha who fifteen years ago was the leader of the Boers, may make a name for himself as a savior of an empire.

Germany's premier dependency about which centered the Teutonic plans for a great colonial empire, has surrendered to the Boers whom Germany encouraged during the Boer war. The grant of England of complete local self government has been vindicated. British democracy will see in Botha's success full justification for the governmental system, which the English are fighting for.

One of the practical effects of the present conquest will be to heighten the value of the imperial tie between the British colonies and the mother country and will lead to the colonists having a larger voice in imperial questions. Here is a basis for possible conflict between England and the Boers. Having won the colony without the help of the mother country, the Boers are anxious to keep it permanently. The aspiration of British South Africa to expand at Germany's expense is now accomplished.

But, if Germany cannot be forcibly driven from Belgium and France, one of the conditions that would be demanded before voluntarily retiring, would possibly be the restoration of the colonies, particularly in southwest Africa. The Boers might be willing to agree to such a plan provided they be given a voice in the control of imperial affairs.

Botha may become known as the father of a new British imperialism.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 12.—"It is the task of the foreign language newspapers of America to Americanize the immigrants who come to this country and once they are assimilated it is the duty of the American press to keep them Americanized," declared Percy Andrea of Chicago, in an address before the International Press Congress in session here. Mr. Andrea represented the American Association of Foreign Language Newspapers.

Mr. Andrea deplored the belief today that to depart from the methods of the past is to show signs of progressive thinking. He condemned newspapers which spoke lightly of what he called the fundamental principles upon which this country was founded.

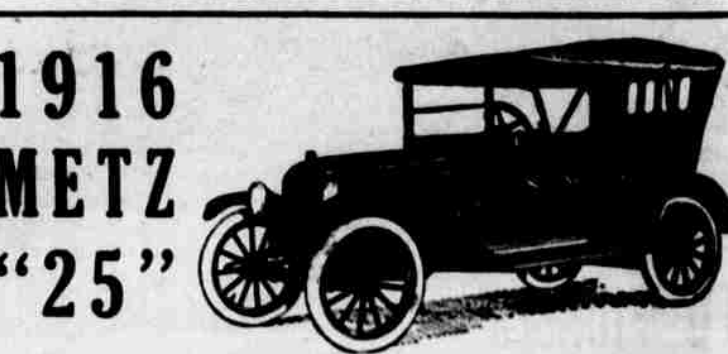

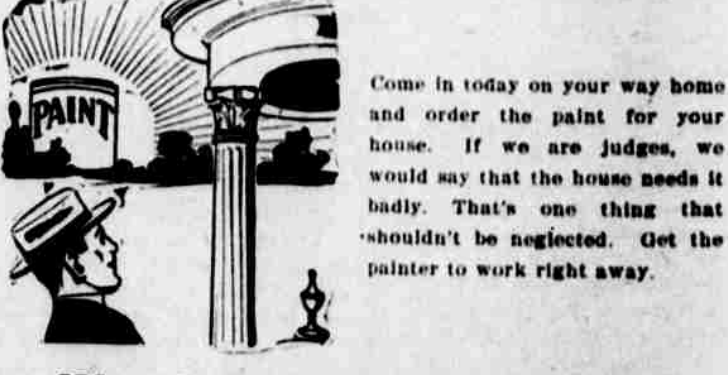
