NEW YORK, July 10.—Now that the ban on racing has been lifted in New York, fashions have developed quite a racy tendency as 'twere. Following the ponies is almost synonymous with following the fashions and at the track you find you are on the track of as many winners as there are feminine entries in the grandstand and the best kind of book to make is a fashion book.

Many a dainty filly one glimpses there is approximately garbed in flit lace although other thoroughbreds obviously not in the maiden class also go in for costumes adorned with this charming square meshed lace. With floppy hats of horsehair braid vie with the large hats of leghorn and the transparent effects of chiffon, Georgette crepe and maline. They are effectively, but simply trimmed in a single large rose or a huge bow of ribbon.

As for the ribbons there is even more of a run on them than ever and they appear in all sort of places and manners or garnishment. As ruffling or plain edging on the edges of the many tiered chiffon flounced skirts the inch and the two inch wide satin ribbon is used extensively. Shirling of the half inch width is lavishly applied over silk, net, chiffon or organdie surfaces. Skeleton uppers formed of six strands of ribbon attached to a waist band support the frothy and frilly wired flounces that, worn under the full skirted sheer dancing and garden frocks, give the delectable crinoline effect.

A new novel sleeve for the evening gowns of summer is made of inch wide ribbon set in the arm size and caught in again in a ribbon band half way between the shoulder and the elbow. The resultant little cap sleeve of the ribbon lengths allows tantalizing visions of snowy arm between.

The straight trig lines of the smart

little pony jackets are the favorites for the moment of the strictly tailored skirts adorned with the practical pockets. These suits are very smart developed in checked suiting in black and white, blue and yellow, brown and white, or brown and yellow. I saw a stunning one in bronze green and white check with lapels and the patch pockets of white broadcloth. A pink carnation worn in the button-hole added just the right dash of vivid color.

Speaking of horse fashions the showing of mules for wear within the environs of the boudoir, bedroom or bath is mighty tempting. There can simply be no kick about these mules for they are beautiful enough to make even Venus discard her sandals for a pair. They come in all shades of satin, either quilted or plain, and are finished with a silk cord of the same tone around the top. A dainty satin rose bud, a chiffon pom-pom glistening with the crystal dew drops or a tiny buckle of brilliant adorns the instep.

WAR SALES ARE SANCTIONED, BUT

IS AMERICA WILLING TO BREAK
WITH GERMANY ON ACCOUNT
OF THIS? IS QUERY OF GER-
MAN EDITOR

NEW YORK, July 12.—In a copyright statement published by the New York World today, Maximilian Harden, noted editor of Die Zukunft, of Berlin, admits the right of American munition firms to deal with the Allies, but asks if the right is worth the price of rupture with Germany. The statement follows:

"Sin may be committed on both sides of the Atlantic. The average America has heard far more out of Germany regarding the lack of freedom, feudal autocracy, aristocracy, outward lack of culture and militarism than of her strength, force, efficiency, organization, unselfishness, and spirit of self-sacrifice and the religious ideals of the German people.

"On the other hand, to many Germans, the American is known too much as a dollar chaser and money-maker without ideals. Too little has the German been told regarding the intellectualism and idealism, which exists among the people of North America.

"The policy of the United States, the main interest of which in South America and the Far East, perhaps does not recognize yet that this war will answer the question: 'Shall England, which is a world power, remain judge of Europe—on the continent on which she has but one small point of support—Gibraltar?'

"The new form of submarine warfare will, in its evolution, make impossible any tyranny of the sea in the future. The war has already decided that England has lost undisputed and absolute dominion of the sea—no successes on land will offset that.

"A majority of Germans believe that America is supplying our enemies with arms and ammunition in violation of law and custom. This is a wrong belief. According to The Hague convention American private firms can sell to whom they like and what they like. But the realistic intellect of Americans must ask itself these questions:

"Can we demand of Germany on the strength of their friendship for us, that they give up the possibility of destroying ships and the cargoes of which would kill, maim and wound uncounted members of their sons and brothers?

"Would we do it if in their situation?

"Is this manufacture of arms and ammunition so important in our business and national economies as to justify us in engaging the enmity of a people, which, like ourselves is not in the descending, but in the ascending scale of humanity and development of civilization and culture?

"America is free to answer these questions as she sees fit. Neither of the two countries can hope, through fear to gain anything of the other."

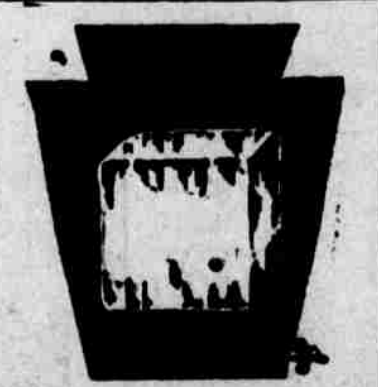
