AN EXAMPLE OF BUSINESS

KLAMATH FALLS may well take a glance at what a sister city of ours is doing, and that is Ashland. They have some real boosters there, and are starting out after things.

But recently they have completed a bath house, which they are developing or preparing to develop into a sanitarium, and it has been done by the people to a great extent, the city having furnished the bonds for construction.

While we are hollering about calamity, hard times and headed straight for bankruptcy—said chronicles coming from certain quarters—other cities in the state are looking ahead and working for the future. Are we going to keep pace with them? Are we going to keep up, or go down?

Ashland is working through its Commercial Club and its women's auxiliaries, and they are doing things. It is now up to us to work with our Commercial Club and give it every possible support. We have a number of projects here under way that are worthy of work and attention, and mean much to this county. If the reclamation service does not come through with the money promised us, let's forget it and go ahead. We want it, but let's not sit down and not play because we do not get it.

Other places want things, too, which they do not get. If we work and do something for ourselves, boost and make them come through with the things we want by sheer force later on, they will come through bigger than we expect—they will have to. The main thing is to keep chugging along on what we have, keeping up and working on all the projects, but making advancement along some lines. The others will come.

Here is what the secretary of the Ashland Club says in Portland:

"Ashland, the metropolis of Jackson county, has ambitions to become a great tourist city."

M. J. Duryea, director of publicity of the Ashland Commercial Club, says "the city is backing its ambition with the expenditure of \$175,000 on parks and mineral water baths.

"Mr. Duryea is in Portland, and is enthusiastically calling attention to the wonders of this city and county. He says the city has acquired sixty acres of parks, has twenty-five miles of scenic drives, and in the neighborhood are forty sulphur springs. Water from one of these springs is being piped to the city, and is to be one of the attractions.

"Besides these things he reminds one of the wonderful Josephine county, and Crater Lake, and Pelican Bay, and asks why, with all these natural attractions and a climate that is favorable the year around, should Ashland not become a tourist city of world wide fame?"

Repudiates Her Accused Husband

The arrest of T. G. Forney, the Washington attorney, in Pittsburg on the charge of having made an attack on his father-in-law, T. Franklin Schneider, a candy manufacturer of Washington, has resulted in the repudiation of her husband by Mrs. Forney. She has issued a formal statement repudiating his name forever.

Mrs. Forney signed the statement with her maiden name, Florence Schneider.

"The statement attributed to Tom Forney that he has received a letter from me is false," Mrs. Forney says in her statement. "I repudiate his name. I am too loyal to my father."

Members of the Schneider family put no faith in the theory that Forney is of unshaken mind. They believe that his alleged attack on Mr. Schneider was the result of a plot conceived many months ago.

State Industrial Board Guards Factory Workers

The present popular movement for safety first is of recent origin. Not that danger is new to the human race. Far from it. Every year since the beginning the young and strong have been carried away by sudden death. Long ago men learned to guard against perils that beset them. It became primal instinct. A cougar sneaking, listening and peering in the woods of Oregon is one of the original adherents of the safety first idea. So it is with the human race. Men were wary of the perils of animal force. All men went armed. The instinct still remains. We still fear brute violence. Children are told that if they are not good the bogies or bears will get them, and many a little youngster has seen these creatures in his dreams. But the practical danger of attacks by wild animals is now infinitesimal, and the blessings of good government have made almost unnecessary any precautions by the individual against an assault by his neighbor.

What is the greatest factor in the solution of this problem? Simply stated it is this: Educate the man. It is an extremely superficial treatment of the subject of industrial accidents to say that the laborer is negligent, and that he should avoid these dangers. The experience of no one factory can be sufficient to show all the dangers in any industry. How, then, can one laborer in that factory judge intelligently of his danger if he has not the facts before him, if, perhaps, he has never heard of accidents in his particular occupation. A careful man may well become unmindful of dangers if he has no reason to believe that it exists, or if he works in a mill where there is a general atmosphere of carelessness. And a naturally negligent man may be stimulated to exercise a high degree of care if placed in a mill where safety first is preached and practiced. The solution of this problem, then, largely lies in educating men in the nature of hazards that surround them.

In many of the states this movement for safety education is already well under way. The public is being aroused, school children are being lectured, workmen in mills are being stimulated to greater care. Pictures, printed warnings, posters, statistics graphically portrayed, these are the means used in the new movement. All hands from the employer down working together for a decrease of accidents, this is the new industrial ideal. The difficult problem is to stimulate the imagination to a realization of danger, just as the mind was awakened to an instinctive knowledge of the old dangers of brute force. Crime involving personal violence is hideous and deplorable, and yet indifference to the hazards of every-day life is ten fold more terrible in its results. And the next step in industrial and social progress in Oregon is to awaken employers and workmen to realize this fact. This is the task of safety education.

HOW TO USE WEIGHT SEALER

MAJORITY OF DEALERS MEAN TO BE HONEST, SAYS CALIFORNIA OFFICIAL, WHILE SOME ARE SIMPLY CARELESS

United Press Service SACRAMENTO, July 13.—"Don't forget that pounds and pints are cash, and should be given the same consideration as change.

"Don't feel that you are doing something wrong or to be ashamed of, if you ask the dealer to weigh your purchase a second time.

"If you think you are not getting the correct weight or measure, go to the county sealer. If the dealer has cheated you, give the county sealer the name."

These are a few "hunches for housewives" set forth by William C. Hendricks, chief deputy of the state department of weights and measures.

There have been sixty-five county sealers and a number of deputies appointed by the state sealer. They are testing and sealing scales and measures and are rounding up violators. It is to the interest of the public to aid in the work by reporting to the county sealer. Purchasers can help by reporting to county sealers when they think they have been cheated. Hendricks has found that a single family has been "short measured" and "short weighted" out of as much as \$75 worth of provisions in one month.

"I believe that 95 per cent of the dealers mean to be honest," says Hendricks, "but one dishonest dealer can do a lot of damage. For instance, we had a case where a dealer was selling sugar for one cent a pound less than another grocer across the street. The second dealer began losing customers, but well knew that he could not cut the price of sugar and give honest weight. Rather than have purchasers pass him by, he began cutting the weight. And that is just what we found the other fellow was doing."
