THE LIBERTY BELL

IT WOULD be fitting and proper if the mayor of the city would designate a certain time Friday for a short realization of the fact that the Liberty Bell had passed through the state. The bell passes through Ashland Thursday night about midnight, and a huge night celebration is being planned there, and the people are going to turn out en masse.
Some plans had been projected here for Klamath people to journey over to see the bell if it had come through on Saturday, or during the day. Undoubtedly some will go any way. But since it is not so arranged that they might see it, it would be but fitting and proper that we have a tolling of the fire bell or some such observance at the noon hour Friday, to remind us that the bell which once proclaimed the independence of this country as a United States had been near our domiciles.

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION
WORD has been received that the state advisory board of the highway commission left Portland on Monday for the proposed trip over the Pacific and Central Oregon highways. They have written that they expect to be in Klamath Falls Thursday of this week.

They are familiar with the fine roads and boulevards surrounding Portland, and we are to await their verdict on Klamath county's roads. The county court will have charge of the party while here Thursday and Friday, and expect to take them over the county.

As a whole, Klamath's roads are in good condition, and County Judge Hanks states that the county will undoubtedly do more work next year. The Lava Bed road project is being worked on, and should be completed by August 1st, and is the biggest road project in the county at this time.

McLaughlin, Pelican Bay, Spring Creek, Eagle Ridge, Wood River Valley, Lava Beds and any number of points that could be placed on the screen, would compare favorably with any of the European scenery we see displayed in the show houses.

The Medford team is not at all dismayed over the defeat, as it is the first win Grants Pass has to her credit in the three games played.

They have recently added five University of Oregon players to their roster, and are boasting that they have the best amateur club in Southern Oregon or Northern California. While on the other hand Medford has won ten and lost only two games so far, and the record alone should speak for itself.

CRATER LAKE LODGE IS OPEN

MEDFORD, July 14.—The road is open to Crater Lake, travel is increasing daily, and tourists from all over the United States are visiting the scenic wonder. All are surprised to see such a beautiful lodge on the rim, and are delighted with the excellent accommodations and especially with the splendid meals, the bill of fare comprising about everything the market affords. A. L. Parkhurst, president of the Crater Lake company, H. C. Tulled, manager, and all the assistants are pleasant and obliging and do everything possible to show guests a good time. Mr. Tulled has had several years experience at resort hotels and understands how to entertain.

The new lodge recently opened to the public, after being under construction for four years, is 50x120 feet, four stories high, and faces the lake, being only about fifty feet from the rim. On the first floor is the lobby, 30x40 feet, office and lobby 40x50 feet, reception room 30x40 feet and a modern kitchen. There are large fireplaces in the lobby and dining room, and there is also a fireplace on the outside. There are 68 bedrooms on the other three floors, and all modern improvements are provided. Water is brought from a spring a mile from the lodge. Besides the lodge there are floored tent accommodations at the rim for 100 persons, and at the Anna Springs camp for 50 more. The lodge has been erected at a great expense, but the rates charged are very reasonable, and the home people as well as tourists should not fail to visit the lake this year. The oftener you go the better pleased you will be with the lake and trip.

C. M. & St. P. Will Test Electric C. A. Goodnow, assistant to the president of the Milwaukee railroad, announces that tests of electric locomotives which are to pull trains over the Rockies for 440 miles, will begin about October 1. The electrification of the road will cost \$12,000,000. The first tests will be made on the Deer Lodge and Harlowtown division in Montana. Forty locomotives will be delivered on the estimate to save 25 per cent of the power by doing without air, reversing the current on descending grades.
