JAP LOOKS FOR OLD SCHOOL BACK

THINKS AMERICA NEWSPAPERS ARE IMPOSSIBLE—ARTICLES SHOULD BE SIGNED, NEWS, AS WELL AS EDITORIAL.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—American journalism is an irresponsible journalism, says K. Sugimura, editor of the Asahi Shimbun of Tokyo, who is here as a delegate to the International Press Congress. All news stories and all editorials in newspapers should be signed by the author, believes Sugimura. In that way, he says, the responsibility will be fixed. Sugimura said that he could not understand what is meant by the opinion of a newspaper unless it means the opinion of the individual writer. He contends that the break-away from personal to institutional journalism is only temporary, and that this country will again see the old school recognized.

Bomb Expert, and Holt's Trunk Full of Dynamite

Frank Holt, the man who blew up a room in the Capitol at Washington and shot J. P. Morgan, had sufficient dynamite to make bombs for the damage of many big buildings throughout the country. The police of New York found a trunk at a stable and storage warehouse four days after he had made the attempt on the life of the banker. It was shipped by Holt under the name of F. H. Henderson from Central Park, a small village six miles from Glen Cove, where Mr. Morgan lived, to the stable.

The trunk contained the following: 134 sticks of dynamite, 60 per cent strength; three large tin cans for packing the bombs; two boxes of electric fuses, one of blasting caps, a package of chemical, the nature of which is unknown; a package of sulphur, a coil of fuse, a package of sal ammoniac, a dry battery, boxes of fulminate of mercury and vitas, a bottle of muriatic acid, a soldering outfit and a tin cutter, and other small articles used in the manufacture of bombs and handling high explosives.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, July 14.—The Germans have been defeated for the present in their efforts to reach Warsaw from the south. Field Marshal von Mackensen has committed the frequent Slav error of trying to do too much at once, and German strategy has again failed to crush the Russians by a decisive defeat.

Until the fall of Lemberg the Germans concentrated upon a single offensive—the recovery of Galicia. But after the Slavs evacuated Lemberg, von Mackensen divided his forces. He sent one command to drive the Russians from the rest of Galicia, while he himself moved his army toward Warsaw. From that time on the Tenth have met with difficulty.

The Russians have undoubtedly received reinforcements from Southern Poland. Von Mackensen's difficulties have also increased because the Slavs have better means of communication and are now within easy reach of their munition reserve.

It is evident that the Germans did not expect the Russians to recover themselves so quickly. An attempt has been made to create the impression that the fault lies with the Austrians. The accusation is unjust. The German army staff is responsible for operations in Russia. Undoubtedly Germany, for strategic reasons, caused a division of the forces in Russia. But if Warsaw were in peril today the glory would belong to Germany.

NEWSPAPERS ARE PUBLIC UTILITIES

MAY A LONDON EDITOR AT THE FAIR—BECOMING CAPITALISTIC, BUT ARE NECESSARY FOR PUBLIC GOOD

SAN FRANCISCO, July 14.—Journalism is becoming more and more a matter of capital, says Aaron Watson, editorial writer on the London Times, who is here as a delegate to the International Press Congress. This fact, he says, should alarm no one.

Watson says that the capitalistic newspaper is not the one that necessarily backs capitalistic enterprises, and seeks to better the interests of only corporate interests to the disadvantage of the masses. The very character of the newspaper makes it essential to its success to seek the welfare of the general public. The newspaper is a public utility, Watson says.
