THE NEED OF A FEDERAL BUILDING

THE dire need of a federal building in this city was made but forcibly brought to light last night in a bootlegging case brought here from Lakeview. Not only the need of a federal building, but the need of a federal officer who can devote time to stopping the persistent whiskey traffic taking place between the Indians and the whites.

Here was a case where a young man was charged with buying a horse from an Indian for \$10 and two quarts of whiskey. At Lakeview the Indians testified before the district attorney that such a deal had been made, and that they had received the whiskey. They also identified the man who made the deal, one of the bottles being secured as evidence.

The case was brought to Klamath Falls, and the better part of this week has been spent by United States Marshal Berry here waiting for this trial and the arrival of Commissioner Hamaker from his home. When the case was finally brought up last night the United States marshal was compelled to act as prosecuting attorney. The Indians went on the stand, testified as to the trade and to receiving the whiskey, but none of them could testify here that he had seen the whiskey actually pass possession. Not even the Indian who made the trade could identify positively the man who gave him the money or the whiskey.

"There were three all alike, red-headed and dressed alike, and I can't tell them apart," was the sum and substance of it.

As a result the commissioner was compelled to turn the defendant loose when all indications point to the guilt of the accused. The Lakeview sheriff stated while here that money had been offered him to turn the defendant loose, and also said that money had been offered the officials in Lakeview by relatives of the young man in the shape of a fine, providing that the case was dropped.

Reports have reached this city that arrangements are to be made for the trying of these cases here. Medford is the place the law provides for now, but nine-tenths of the cases come from this city and Lakeview. Now is the time to go after the federal building, and go after it hard.

PLAN TO BUILD A BIGGER AND BETTER KLAMATH FALLS

KLAMATH FALLS is to have a modern, efficient commercial organization. This is the conclusion reached last night by the board of directors of the Commercial Club, when they made final arrangements for the consolidation and re-organization of the commercial and civic bodies of this city.

This will greatly increase its efficiency and make it a much larger force for the upbuilding of this city and community from a civic standpoint, as an industrial city, and as the commercial center of the wonderful Klamath country.

That there is need for closer co-operation among the citizens for the advancement of the Klamath country,

no one familiar with conditions can successfully controvert. Like many of the cities of the West, we have lacked that cohesive force essential to the most effective united effort for accomplishing desired ends, civic and commercial.

Here is an opportunity for demonstrating that we as citizens are made of the right stuff, and can get together and stay together in a united work for the common good.

But to make of the reorganized commercial body what it may and should be will require the hearty co-operation of all who are sincere in their desire to have a greater and a better city. Men must not only give the movement their approval, but their service in making the organization effective in its work.

The campaign is to be launched at once, under the guidance of efficiency men who have successfully conducted similar campaigns in all parts of the United States. But our own citizens—you and I and our neighbors and their neighbors—must do the work of making the organization. It is to be our organization, and we must build it and run it.

The details for the re-organization will be carefully worked out and announced from day to day as they are perfected. Every precaution will be taken to have every feature made to fit local conditions, and to secure the greatest efficiency.
