OIL BORING HAS BEEN STOPPED

EFFORT TO BE MADE TO KEEP STANDARD OIL COMPANY OUT OF FIELD IN BELIEVED REASON FOR STOPPING OPERATION

The outfit which has been boring for oil in Poe Valley has stopped work, is the report that was brought to the city this morning, despite the fact that excellent prospects are in sight and oil has been expected at any time.

It is stated that an effort is going to be made to sign up leases on all the land in that vicinity to keep the Standard Oil company out of the field in the future if a good flow of oil should be struck. The leases are being printed in this city.

It is known that several oil men have visited the scene of the boring on the Moschom ranch in Poe Valley, and that they have reported favorably on the prospects. In order to prevent a monopoly on the district by the coming in of outside corporations, the leases are to be signed before the boring outfits will proceed further.

HEAVY ROAD WORK IS PROGRESSING

HEAVIEST PIECE OF ROAD CONSTRUCTION ON COAST NOW UNDER CONSTRUCTION ON SHORE OF UPPER KLAMATH LAKE

Probably the heaviest piece of road construction on the Pacific coast is now under way along the shores of Upper Klamath Lake, which will connect this city and the Wood River Valley with a fine highway, as well as one of the most scenic drives in the state, with an outlook over a lake forty miles in length.

The present contract of the Chapman Construction company, which is doing the work for the county, extends over four miles, and in that distance Mr. Chapman estimates that there is between 60,000 and 80,000 cubic yards of rock and dirt to be moved, the entire distance being through almost solid rock. It is first broken up by dynamite and then moved with a steam shovel. Great care is necessary, owing to the Southern Pacific track being below.

"They are doing a great piece of road work," stated Alex Martin of this city, following a trip to the scene. "The road is through almost solid rock, and is very expensive, but will be worth the price, I believe."

This road extends for from ten to fifteen miles along the shores of Upper Klamath Lake, and when completed will be one of the greatest scenic drives in the state. Its economic advantage to the county will also be great, because of the shortening of the distance between this city and the Wood River Valley country, through which a great share of the Crater Lake and Bend country travel goes, providing a finished highway and cutting out some almost impassable mountain roads during the winter. A 3 per cent grade will be established, where before the climb was tremendous over the old road.

August 1st is the date set by Chapman for the completion of the road, when it will first be open. The finishing touches, however, will be applied later.
