Industrial Education by Oregon's State Expert

It is a common fact that those who confront great hazards day after day will often come to a state of mind in which they no longer realize that danger exists. Cases coming before the state industrial accident commission show that unsafe methods are continually employed in the industries of Oregon.

It is, among other things, a common practice to remove sticks and sawdust from running saws with the fingers, and to clean machinery while in motion. Such lax methods result in a high accident rate. They illustrate the need of safety education. There should be in each plant a central agency whose task it is to keep constantly before the men the necessity for care, even at the expense of haste.

There comes to mind the fate of one man who, working in a hazardous occupation year after year, became dulled to the dangers of his work. Jones was a faller in the woods of Western Oregon. He was about 55 years of age. Ever since he had been spent in mining and logging in the West. He was sturdy and self-confident. He knew the woods like a book. Danger? Hump! There was no danger in the woods for him. Yes, a green kid who did not know how to handle himself, might get hurt, but not a man of his experience.

Jones had two children, a boy and a girl, who were going to school in town. He thought the world of these children, and tears would sometimes fill his eyes as he spoke with pride of the loveableness of the little girl and of the little boy's unusual brightness at school.

One day he was felling a tree which leaned decidedly. He was certain that it would fall just as he had planned, and he did not leave the springboard. The tree crashed against another tree. The butt kicked back and struck Jones, hurling him thirty feet down the hill. He lay without moving a muscle. No stimulants could revive him. He never regained consciousness, and died the following day. Yes, he had grown to believe that there was no danger in the woods.

There are, no doubt, men killed throughout the Northwest each year in that identical manner. But he did not know of these. There was no system by which these tragic experi-

ences could be continually impressed upon the minds of workmen. He could only judge of the hazards of the work by his own experience, and, of course, he misjudged. Now his little children have no daddy. They have both been compelled to go to work. But that is the fate of the families of those who forget danger.

It is such common tragedies as this that make safety education necessary. The blood of many workmen, slain before their time, is a vivid testimony against the present condition of ignorance and indifference to industrial hazards.
