What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, July 10.—Italy's invitation to the leaders of the Republican and Reform-Socialist parties to join the cabinet without portfolios, is an admission of the failure of the Italian military campaign. Under normal conditions these leaders would not have been asked to cooperate with a monarchical ministry.

Evident dissatisfaction is felt over the unexpected resistance encountered by the Italian armies. The government now desires to enlarge the ministry so that in case of future disaster, the revolutionary parties will share the responsibility. The fear of a revolution is never absent from the minds of the Italian statesmen.

After eight weeks the Italians have been unable to advance beyond the first defense. The situation is so serious that Rome has ceased to issue official reports. No casualties have been published but outsiders estimate the losses at 10,000. Correspondents are not allowed at the front with the Italian army.

All indications emphasize the growing seriousness of the Italian situation.

Purity Congress Takes Up Moral Questions

SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—The white slave traffic, the red light districts and their allied evils, social hygiene and public vice were warmly discussed by delegates to the Ninth International Purity Congress at today's session, the first business day of the convention.

Yesterday marked the formal opening of the Purity Congress, and the day was observed all over the country by special services in churches, with appropriate sermons. In this city a great mass meeting was held at which Gov. Hiram Johnson, Mayor James Rolph, (Jr.), of San Francisco, and President of the Exposition C. C. Moore delivered addresses of welcome. Sessions will be held daily all through the week, the farewell meeting of the Congress being July 24.

Thousands of delegates from South America and the Orient as well as from Europe will attend the sessions. Clergymen and social workers from all parts of the United States will take part in the elaborate program which has been completed.

The World's Purity Federation is constantly at work promoting safe and sane instruction in social hygiene and advocates a single standard of morals. The work of the organization is recognized as having been a most potent factor in bringing about the present world-wide agitation against the social evil. Its object, in brief, is to labor for the suppression of vice, the enforcement of law, a more thorough rescue and reform war, the better protection and rearing of the young and to improve the general social health of the community.

On Saturday, July 24, the Purity Congress will hold joint sessions with the International Congress on Marriage and Divorce.

Anthony Comstock, secretary of the New York Society for the Suppression of Vice, is one of the speakers. His topic is "Children of Our Nation, and the Vice to Moral Purity."

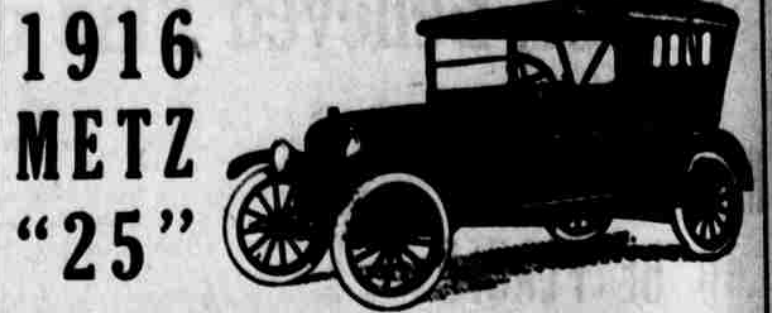
