Johnson Reveals Plans at Luncheon

and are taking place in the work of community organizations are very great, and almost revolutionary in character.

Formerly these bodies existed chiefly for the purpose of memorializing legislative bodies, passing resolutions and sending out highly colored literature.

The properly equipped organization of today is founded upon business principles, planned to do efficient work in the development of the community, and to carry on all its activities in such manner as to get results and get them as economically as possible, so that the members may realize that a dollar's worth of work is obtained for every dollar spent, just as all departments are held to account in any large and well regulated commercial business undertaking.

Henry T. Hoag, of the same organization, was then asked to explain further the plan of organization, which he did by means of a chart showing the tentative arrangement of the activities in which the club is expected to engage. He explained the method by which the departments are made to bear proper relation, one to the other, and the plans provided for the proper segregation of the work so that several departments will each have its due share of attention, and all the undertakings be so co-ordinated as to eliminate duplication of work, and also give all the members an opportunity for performing a share of the duties which the club will have to perform.

The scheme provides for such a distribution of the labor as to relieve the willing from many of the things

which would otherwise be saddled upon them, and call for a wide distribution of the work among the members of the organization.

The plans follow those adopted at Portland, giving to that city what is considered the model commercial organization of the United States; and also at Salem, where they are working with great enthusiasm. The form is so changed as to meet the needs of Klamath Falls and Klamath county, and give an organization of the highest type to secure results.

Portland Will Help

A. L. Mills, president of the First National Bank of Portland, was passing through the city today, and learning of the dinner by President Johnson, remained over to express the good will of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. He was asked for a few remarks, and stated that all recognize the necessity of co-operative effort. Without it the community will not be able to prosper. Portland was divided until these gentlemen came and gave us a united Chamber of Commerce, the largest of the kind in the state, and that organization is able to accomplish much. It is founded upon co-operation, efficiency and economy. Portland Chamber of Commerce stands ready to assist Klamath Falls, if the citizens here will unite for their own advancement.

Must Take Notice

Chas. W. Eberlein was asked to speak and stated that the body of men gathered about the table was such as to be able, if united in a policy, to make any board of directors or set of officers of a railway sit up and take notice. With all working together in the reorganized Commercial Club the development of this county is certain. But Klamath Falls must unite and co-operate with Portland to secure the building of the railroad gap awaiting to be filled.

S. O. Johnson asked for permission to speak and expressed the sentiment that this was the one time when the people seem to be getting in line for right endeavor. It is the best thing that could happen to Klamath Falls. Everything is here for the construction of an organization which will be able to do whatever is most necessary to promote the building of a great community. "We of the Klamath Development Company will stand back of you in

this work and do everything we can in following your lead. The time is ripe for this great forward movement."

Workers Sign

President Johnson asked for volunteers to assist in securing memberships in the organization, and thirty of those present volunteered. They will soon begin a campaign such as this city has never seen, and the membership will be built up.

Chas. S. Moore Dies in Portland

ed the first county judge of Klamath county and served as postmaster.

Chas. S. Moore was for many years a leader of the Republican party of Klamath county and Southern Oregon while his opinions carried weight in party councils throughout the state. Mr. Moore reached his highest political honors as treasurer of Oregon but his strongest ambition was not to win political prominence but rather to gain success through legitimate lines of business and to promote his usefulness as a citizen by advancing the substantial upbuilding of the section in which he made his home. In both these ways his accomplishments were large and beneficial.

He spent his early days at home coming to Klamath county in 1874. He supplemented his public school education by studying at Willamette university through two winters. He was 17 years old when he came here and for the first year was employed at the Agency and later at a traders' station at the Agency and Fort Klamath. He planned to practice law and went to Portland to study but gave this up and in 1877 he returned to Linkville, now Klamath Falls. At that time Southern Oregon was one county, Jackson, where he assisted his father in building the first sawmill, of which he was a third owner.

In 1887 his brother Rufus, a resident of this city, purchased the father's interest, Charles already having purchased a half interest and they continued in the mill business until about ten years ago.

About 1878 Mr. Moore began work

in the only store at Klamath Falls and continued until 1884 when he purchased a fourth interest and became manager until 1898 when he was elected state treasurer. At the time of his death he was vice-president of the First National Bank of this city and also the First National Bank at Merrill and was a director of the old Klamath County bank until it was merged with the First National in 1911. Banking represented his only active business up until three years ago when he first started to fail.

At one time Charles and Rufus owned about 20,000 acres in Klamath county but most of this has been disposed of. They built the power plant on the west side of Link river, afterward acquiring the electric and water plants of the Klamath Falls Light and Water Company, combined the different plants until about four years ago, when they sold to what is now the California-Oregon Light and Power Company. With his brother, Ben Selling and Moses Blum of Portland they purchased a lot at the corner of Sixth and Alder streets in Portland and there built a 12 story building, known as the Selling building, which they still own. In all that he has undertaken Mr. Moore won success by his judgment, keen discrimination and his ability to recognize opportunities.

Chas. Moore is reputed to be worth \$300,000 to \$400,000. He also made a success in politics being born a Republican. At the age of 21 he was defeated for the office of county clerk of Lake, which at that time included both Klamath and Lake by but 40 votes. In 1880 he was elected school clerk of Linkville district No. 1 and filled that position for ten years following which he was elected school director for two terms of three years each. He was elected a member of the first board of trustees of Klamath Falls and was made the first president of the board. In 1894 he was elected county judge and held that office until 1898. In 1898 he was made a delegate to the national convention at St. Louis which nominated McKinley and had the honor of being the Oregon member which inserted in the platform a gold standard plank which caused the free silver delegates to bolt the convention. In 1898 he was nominated for state

treasurer and was elected by 10,000 majority. Four years later he was renominated by acclamation in the state convention and was re-elected by 15,000 majority. When Klamath county was formed he became the first chairman of the county central committee and acted in that position for eight or ten years. He was also a delegate to all but one or two state conventions from 1883 to 1898. He was equally opposed to anything like misrule in politics believing that political leaders should work for the interests of the majority rather than for the few.

In 1884 Mr. Moore was united in marriage to Miss Mary L. Langell of Jacksonville, Oregon, who is living and was at the bedside this morning when Mr. Moore passed away. But two sons survive Mr. Moore, Chas. L. and John M. Charles is a graduate of the Hill Military Academy of Portland and a graduate of the electrical engineering school of O. A. C. John attended the state university at Eugene and is now acting assistant cashier of the First National Bank of this city.

Mr. Moore held membership with the Ancient Order of United Workmen and had attained high rank in Masonry, being connected with the Oregon consistory, No. 1, A. A. S. R. of Portland and Al Kader Temple of the Mystic Shrine. His record is one which will bear the strong light of keen investigation and, judged by the highest standards, there can be found but little to criticize. He was also a member of Klamath Falls Lodge 1247, B. P. O. Elks.

Man and Wife Arrested.

Joe was accused of stealing a saddle belonging to Jack but the case was dismissed on faulty complaint by Justice of Peace Gowen. The assault and battery charge has not come up yet.
