

Roosevelt Denounces Bryan's Peace Treaties

WANTS ADEQUATE ARMY AND NAVY TO PROTECT FROM ANY FOREIGN ADVOCATES STRONG NAVY FOR COAST—PEACE TREATIES SCORNE

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21.—Col. Roosevelt arrived at the exposition and addressed 15,000 people on "War and Peace". He urged that this country be prepared for war and that a navy superior to that of any possible foe should be built with an adequate and efficient army. He advocated a universal military service similar to the Swiss plan.

that America has been culpable and is almost as bad as the orientals in not preparing ourselves last year. He urged an adequate navy for the Pacific Coast.

Colonel Roosevelt also denounced Bryan's peace treaties adding that "they were explicit promises that, if American women were raped and American men murdered as in Mexico; that if American men, women and children were drowned in the sea as happened when the Lusitania and the Gulftide were sunk; that if a foreign power fortified Magdalena Bay, we would appoint a commission which would listen for years to conversation and discussion of the subjects before they would take action."

They also look to Klamath county to take the award for fresh rhubarb, and Klamath county can expect to be at least in the running for several other awards, if the people will respond to the call for products promptly.

The rhubarb sent by L. Stern of Dairy created a great sensation; the vegetable display has created a furore—how, then, would it be possible to describe the attention the county would attract if her dairying, farming, cheese and butter making, wool-raising, grain, etc., were set before the public by means of some displays of these products.
