England's fear for Petrograd, cannot possibly be maintained on a major scale if the Germans persist in their advances upon Warsaw from the northwest and southeast, besides maintaining an offensive in Galicia. There is not enough ammunition available to Germany to permit so gigantic a task.

It is not likely even though the Germans had sufficient ammunition to permit such a movement, that an advance upon Warsaw will be continued from two directions. Field Marshal von Mackensen will probably again attempt to advance, but Field Marshal von Hindenburg's movement is no more than a diversion for the purpose of preventing the Russians from concentrating against von Mackensen.

Mr. Chase is the foremost man in the United States in the planning, systematizing, organizing and financing of community organizations and the conducting of campaigns for all forms of public advancement and upbuilding. It is expected that he will speak chiefly upon the question of commercial organization work and the things required to make it efficient and worth while.

No other man in the country has visited so many commercial organizations in the United States and studied their methods and needs as Mr. Chase has, and no other has had a part in forming so many of the really successful and prominent chambers of commerce, commercial clubs and other community organizations.

In the letter accompanying the invitation to the dinner, Dr. Johnson says further:

What is Wanted.

The directors of the Commercial Club believe there is a recognized need for a bigger, better and stronger organization in the city than now exists. In view of this they have made a careful study and investigation of the work which other cities are doing.

"As a result of this study and investigation, they have worked out a plan to increase the scope of work and efficiency of the Commercial Club, which will make it the equal of any similar organization, and a power for developing the resources of Klamath county and securing its needs."

"I am for a modern Commercial Club which shall be strong enough to do the things which ought to be done for the city and county."

The letter is suggestive of the object of the dinner, in addition to the demonstration of the spirit of unity, as being a further discussion of the plans for making the Commercial Club the strong organization it should be and the leading factor in promoting the development of all this section of the state of Oregon.

Undoubtedly a great majority of the citizens of Klamath Falls will echo the sentiment expressed in the closing sentence of President Johnson's letter.

INDIANS FOIL OREGON LAW

INDIAN TAKES BRIDE TO CALIFORNIA TO GET AROUND OREGON LAW—CLERK AT YREKA ASKS DELAP ABOUT LAW

The mere fact that the Oregon law prohibits the issuance of a marriage license, by County Clerk DeLap, to a three-fourths breed Indian did not stop Ross Beal from securing a license to marry the lady of his choice, formerly Miss Grace Allen.

He procured an automobile yesterday and went to Yreka where they applied for a license before the county clerk there, which was granted to the couple.

Beal stated that he was supposed to be a full blooded Indian while Miss Allen is a three-quarter breed. The law prohibits the marriage of Indians with more than a half mixture of white and Indian blood in this state.

The clerk at Yreka phoned here regarding the couple to ascertain if everything was satisfactory, and why they came there. He was informed that the Oregon law prohibited the license being issued in this city. He then asked DeLap if there was anything in the California law on the same point.
