Death Watch Is Placed on Arizona Murderers

PHOENIX, Ariz., July 22.—The death watch was again placed today over the five murderers condemned to hang in Florence penitentiary before July 30. These are the five men who were saved from the gallows at the eleventh hour last May by the intervention of W. J. Bryan, then secretary of state. Bryan asked for a reprieve at the request of General Francisco Villa, who claimed his countrymen had been unfairly tried. Five pine coffins, their rough boards cracked by the sun, stand in the prison yard at Florence waiting for the condemned men. They have stood there ever since May 23, when the condemned men, has been granted the right to appeal again by Judge Vaughn of Pinal county, but the time limit for it has elapsed, and Attorney General Jones advised Warden Sims today to disregard the appeal and hang Villalobos with the others. Petitioners for a referendum election to abolish capital punishment are in circulation, but gaining few signatures. Attorneys for the five men plan a new appeal to the United States circuit court in San Francisco. Governor Hunt refuses to divulge what his plans are. He intends to be in San Francisco on the date set for the hangings, but the five are still confident that the "big governor" won't let them be killed. The board of pardons says there will be no further delay. The Arizona supreme court is on a vacation, and Federal Judge Sawtelle, to whom the condemned men appealed last May, is in California.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 22.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt still lives up to his reputation as the nation's most strenuous citizen. The former president, who is visiting the Panama-Pacific exposition this week, hasn't taken the time for a moment's rest since he alighted from a train in Oakland Tuesday evening. This is the way he is "doing" San Francisco. He arrived Tuesday evening and was escorted by a company of soldiers to his hotel. Then he was left by his friends as they supposed to enjoy a period of rest. But no, he and Mrs. Roosevelt slipped down out of one of the private elevators and out a side door entrance, to get into an auto and whiz out to the exposition grounds. There they enjoyed solitude until they were found by an exposition guard. In a moment a crowd had gathered and this was taken as a signal to hurry back to the hotel. Yesterday Roosevelt's secretary announced to both friends of the Colonel and the newspapers as well, that the former president must have the morning to himself. But at an early hour he and Mrs. Roosevelt slid out of the hotel when no one was looking, enjoyed a little ride and took the time to do a little shopping.
