GETTING IN STEP WITH PROGRESS

THE COMMITTEE on re-organization of the Commercial Club in working up the plans to meet the conditions existing in Klamath Falls and Klamath county, have been mindful of the necessity in every such organization of providing for an adequate fund to carry on the work, and are shaping the foundation plans so as to provide for this essential. Every organization devoted to commercial and civic progress must have an ample income in order to accomplish anything of value and properly carry forward its work.

But the committee also realizes that it is equally essential that the officers of such an organization, no matter how capable and efficient they may be, shall be supported in their efforts by an enthusiastic and united body of men—men who will lend influence to the organization and will also give a little of their time and personal service to the work of their own organization.

The committee has found, on investigating the matter, that it is the cities which possess such an organization, with the men working in unison and under intelligent direction, that are setting the pace in the march of progress and showing the finest development of their resources.

The committee is seeking to have for Klamath Falls just such an organization, the foundations for which have been well laid in the form of organization already worked out. Within a few days the committee will ask the active men of the city who believe in progress and that progress comes only through intelligent and business-like operation of public affairs, to co-operate with them in the movement to provide a commercial body of this kind for Klamath Falls.

It is a large and important work which they have in hand. But it is a necessary work, if Klamath Falls is to come to her own. There are enough good and true men in Klamath Falls to carry out this work. Nothing that is worth while is too great for the progressive men of this city to undertake, and nothing they enter into wholeheartedly is ever permitted to fail. In some respects Klamath Falls and Klamath county are unique; and the persistent determination of the citizens, once they start upon the work is on par with the magnitude and variety of the county's resources.

This undertaking for a greater Commercial Club, having for its purpose the bringing together of all the interests and all the public spirited in the city into one great working force, aiming to push Klamath Falls and vicinity ahead as never before, should have the cordial support of all live, enterprising citizens of the community.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, July 23.—If Warsaw falls, Field Marshal von Hindenburg, whose army has been encamped west of the city since last autumn, will have proved to have been the decisive factor in the campaign against the Russian city. Von Hindenburg's army is steadily creeping nearer Warsaw while the Russians are rallying to check the advance of the enemy from the north and from the south.

Von Hindenburg's original plan of making a direct assault from the west, seems to have been adopted again. The failure of Field Marshal von Mackensen's campaign from the south is becoming more apparent each day. If he supercedes von Hindenburg as the Kaiser's eastern confident, he may not long hold that position.

Warsaw's chances of holding out against the enemy are about even. The armies penetrating the city were immediately weakened when help was needed again to reinforce the opposition against von Mackensen.

Theoretically there is no reason why the Slavs cannot hold Warsaw even with a weakened force. They have had months in which to strengthen their defenses. However short they may be of high powered shells, it is improbable that they seriously lack machine gun ammunition.

If Warsaw is abandoned it means that Russia's phlegma is giving way to a disquieting imagination. If that characteristic develops, a separate peace may not be far distant.

Greatest Arms Works Is Troubled by a Strike

GRAVE DANGER OF FOREST FIRES

COUNTY HAS BEEN FORTUNATE SO FAR, STATES THE DISTRICT WARDEN, BUT EXPECTS FIRES NOW—ONE MATCH WILL DO IT

The Southern Oregon district over which Fire Warden Chitwood has charge has been fortunate so far according to Chitwood, having no very serious fires to contend with. He has 13 association boys under him and there are a number of private foresters in various parts of the county.

"My district is better prepared to control any fires which get started than ever before," states Chitwood, but we are going to need all the men this year. The timber is dry now, and due to general dryness of the season it is now becoming extremely dangerous.

"Few people realize what a little thing will start a fire sometimes that will prove a hard one to handle or control if conditions are favorable in that spot. The simple dropping of a match will start a fire along the road that may develop into a large forest fire. I have distinguished one fire already which was started simply by the dropping of a match along the road."

"We could keep our fires down to a minimum if every person going into the timber would be careful and not careless. It means dollars and cents to the state and more this year than ever before."
