MODOCERS EAT AT BIG CAVE

COMPLETION OF ROAD IS CAUSE
OF PICNIC AND JOLLIFICATION
IN THE LAVA BEDS BY LOOK-
OUT CITIZENS

ALTURAS, July 28.—At the completion of the Modoc end of the Lava Beds road, twenty-seven persons motored from Lookout to Mammoth Cave and had dinner in the wonderland. The Modoc end of the road passes the Mammoth Cave, one of the largest caves known, and comes up to the Siskiyou county line, passing over a natural bridge over a huge crack in the Lava Beds known as the Great Divide. Other points near the road are Bear Foot Cave, the only water in the beds, Glass Mountain and Canby's Cross.

A movement has been started in Lookout for the erection of a suitable monument at the spot where Canby and his small band of soldiers were massacred by the Modocs while encamped for dinner.

MAJOR WORDEN TO REBUILD
DAMAGED BUILDING, AND TIN-
DALL WILL CONTINUE THEAT-
ER AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

The Orpheus theater, practically gutted by fire Monday night of this week, the fire occurring about 3:30 in the morning, will be rebuilt as soon as possible, and the operation of the theater will be continued, stated A. Y. Tindall this morning.
