RATTLERS AND
MAN TANGLE
GETS OFF HIS HORSE TO KILL
ONE SNAKE, WHEN ANOTHER
ATTACKS FROM REAR—RE-
LIEVED LIFE WILL BE SAVED

POMONA, Calif., July 25.—Don S.
Scott, a rancher north of here, is re-
covering today from several rattle-
snake bites, which for a time serious-
ly threatened his life.
Scott saw a rattler, and jumped
from his horse to kill it. While he
was stamping on it a second snake at-
tacked him from the rear, fastening
its fangs in Scott's boot. The rancher
slipped and fell, and a general
mix-up ensued, from which the man
finally emerged victorious, and made
a dash for his horse. A wild ride to
Claremont followed, where he was
given heroic anti-rattler treatment
by a physician. Today Scott's leg is
badly swollen to the hip, but it is
thought the bites will not prove fatal.

FRUIT GROWERS
MEET AT FAIR
HUNDREDS ARE IN ATTENDANCE
AT CONVENTION IN INTEREST
OF HORTICULTURISTS WHICH
CONTINUES UNTIL SATURDAY

PALO ALTO, Calif., July 25.—Hun-
dreds of delegates from every county
in California are here today to attend
the annual conference of the Califor-
nia State Fruit Growers' Association.
The meetings will be held here until
Saturday, when the delegates will ad-
journe to the Panama-Pacific exhibi-
tion at San Francisco to participate in
the celebration of Horticultural Day.

The conference will be devoted to
the discussion of the fruit industry
in all its phases. Government experts
from the United States Department of
Agriculture are on the program.
Beginning today a special confer-
ence was held by the county horti-
cultural commissioners for discussion
of county and state inspection work.
One of the important sub-meetings
will be that of the West Coast Potato
Association. Special subjects relative
to potato production will be discussed
by growers and experts.

Passengers Submarine Tried to Kill

These passengers on the Cunard
liner Orduna from Liverpool escaped
the fate of passengers of the Lusitania
because the aim of the German
submarine commander who attacked
their vessel, July 9, was not as good

as that of the German who sent more
than 1,000 to the bottom on the large-
est Cunarder. Every passenger of the
Orduna was awakened at 6 o'clock in
the morning by stewards, who direct-
ed them to put on life belts. Baron
Rosenkrantz and his wife were among
the passengers who donned life belts.
This is the baron's vivid account of
the attack:

"I had been watching an American
bark passing us, and noted it was half
past five o'clock. Suddenly there was
a commotion on the after bridge on
the port side, and I saw the lookout
there quickly work the telegraph to
the navigation bridge. Captain Taylor
signalled for full speed ahead and
swung her suddenly to starboard. I
could see the white wake of the tor-
pedo, but could not see the subma-
rine. The fact that the ship was
swung sharply to starboard probably
saved her, for the maneuver caused
the torpedo to pass within ten feet of
the stern. My wife and her maid
were below, and I went for them and
brought them back on deck. For
eight or ten minutes we saw nothing
of the submarine, and the captain,
running a zig-zag course, kept on full
speed ahead. Suddenly on the star-
board quarter the submarine rose to
the surface, and it was apparent
through my glass that the crew was
unlimbering a gun to fire on us. Cap-
tain Taylor and E. C. Clapham, the
Chief officer, on the bridge, threw
themselves flat on the deck to escape
the gunfire. My wife and I followed
their example. The first shell whis-
tled over us. The second shell went
short and fell astern of us. The sub-
marine was being distanced, but at
intervals of three or four minutes
shells were fired. The submarine was
fast falling astern and with a parting
shot, which went very wide of the
mark, she gave up the chase."
