DEER SEASON OPENS AUG. 15

DATE IS FIFTEEN DAYS LATER THIS YEAR THAN PREVIOUSLY. STATE GAME WARDEN ON TRIP OF INSPECTION

PORTLAND, July 29.—Notices are being sent out from the state game warden's office that the deer hunting season this year does not open until August 15th, which is fifteen days later than has been customary for a number of years. Deputy wardens throughout the state are being instructed to give all possible publicity to the change in the opening date.

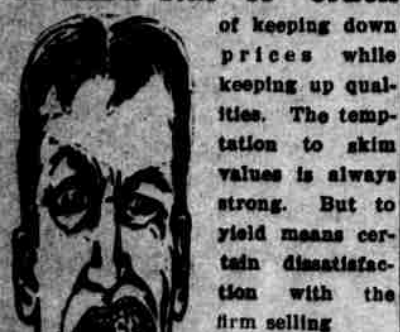
"The purpose is to carry on a campaign of prevention of law violations, rather than make arrests," says F. M. Brown, chief clerk for the state game warden. "We want all hunters to remember the change in dates for deer hunting made by the last legislature, so none will plan a trip before the legal season opens. The bag limit is three buck deer with horns in one year, and it is lawful to hunt until October 31st."

Carl D. Shoemaker, the game warden, has been out on his trip of inspection for over a week, having visited Southern Oregon and then gone across the Cascade range to Klamath Falls, Burns, Bend and other Central Oregon points. He will stop at a number of Columbia River points, and also inspect the hatchery at Bonville.

At all places visited Mr. Shoemaker held conferences with the deputy game wardens, and made plans for a campaign of prevention of unlawful hunting and fishing. He spoke with Chief Clerk Brown over the long distance phone regarding a letter to all the newspapers of the state, asking publicity on the change of the season for deer hunting.

BROWN APPEARS BEFORE GOWEN

IN ABSENCE OF UNITED STATES COMMISSIONER, JUSTICE OF PEACE ACTS—BROWN GIVEN A PRELIMINARY HEARING

In the absence of United States Commissioner J. O. Hamaker, Justice of the Peace Gowen is holding the preliminary hearing of Joe Brown accused by the government of stabbing Eugene Isaacs, from which wounds Isaacs died.

The alleged stabbing took place on the Indian reservation about a week ago near Klamath Marsh, when Isaacs and Brown were having trouble over land. Isaacs was stabbed and later brought to old Fort Klamath, where it was necessary for him to undergo two operations in an attempt to save his life, according to Dr. A. A. Soule of Fort Klamath. The attempt failed, and he died last Saturday afternoon.

Frank Richardson, Willie Kirk and Ira Isaacs, a son of Eugene Isaacs, were the witnesses called this morning to testify in the case.

Judge Drake is appearing for the defendant, Joe Brown, and after a conference with Deputy United States Attorney Du Pree, it developed that the defense would not attempt to disprove that Isaacs did not die from the wounds received by the stabbing. Richardson, Kirk and Ira Isaacs were all present at the time of the stabbing.

It seems that all four of the Indians, including Eugene Isaacs, were at a house near the Brown place when Eugene Isaacs and Richardson started out for the Brown place. Ira Isaacs and Kirk were sent out to fix a fence, and on returning, according to their story, followed the other two men to the Brown place, where they witnessed the stabbing.

Most of the evidence given by the witnesses was damaging to the defendant, as they testified that Brown pulled his knife and commenced stabbing Isaacs, with but little provocation. Isaacs did not draw his knife until later, and up until noon it was not shown whether he opened it or not.

A bundle of clothes and two knives form the exhibits, the clothes, supposed to be Isaacs, are covered with blood, and the shirt is pierced by jagged holes where Brown is supposed to have stabbed him. One of the knives is a long, spring-action dirk knife, and is supposed to have been Brown's, and the one used in the stabbing. The other is smaller, and is supposed to have been Isaacs', and was handed to him through the fence when he asked for it, after Brown had stabbed him. After being stabbed the first time, Isaacs had taken Brown down, and let him up when he promised to be good, according to the witnesses.

The prisoner, Joe Brown, is of a much different nature than Jim George, who was tried here a month ago on a murder charge. He appears very nervous, and sits in his chair with his eyes glued on the witnesses as they testify, becoming especially nervous when they relate of the stabbing in their testimony.

At the conclusion of the evidence late this afternoon, Brown was held to the federal grand jury without bonds by Justice Gowen.

LATE BULLETINS

Aberdeen—Captain Delk of the steamer Leelanaw, sunk near here, arrived at Dunkee with his crew, where they have made out statements. They said they were well treated, and were brought to shore on the German submarine which sunk the vessel.

Copenhagen—A submarine has sunk the Swedish bark Madeonna, the crew escaping in boats.

Rock Springs, Wyo.—Wm. Baker and several others are missing and a \$100,000 loss of property was sustained in a cloudburst here. The Union Pacific railway was washed out.

Austin, Tex.—"Roosevelt's life will not be worth ten cents if after August he makes a move to embroil America in a war with Germany," said a threatening letter mailed here, directed to San Diego. A man and his son have been arrested, no names being divulged.

London—Ten were drowned when a British freighter, the name not ascertained, sunk in three minutes after being torpedoed off Suffolk. Eight of the crew were rescued.

Washington.—Gerard has been asked to ascertain Germany's version of the sinking of the Leelanaw.

Medford—Ferdinand Osebrugge, age 70, treasurer of the Medford Commercial Club, committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself through the head. It is believed that worry over the war and financial troubles temporarily deranged his mind. He left notes expressing hope that England would be defeated.

BRYAN PASSES THRU RAPIDLY

ARRIVES IN MACHINE, EATS DINER AT WHITE PELICAN, AND GOES ON TO CRATER LAKE. POOR PHONE SPOOLS PLANS

Poor telephone service prevented William Jennings Bryan from receiving a much different reception here last night than he was accorded. E. B. Hall of this city with J. A. Gordon were proceeding in the direction of Ager yesterday when they met the Bryan party coming this way. Mr. Hall attempted to get into telephone communication here, but was unable to do so.

He then had his message relayed by the centrals along the line, informing the hotel here that Bryan was coming in last night. It was taken for granted that he would be in on the train, and preparations were made to receive him at the depot, central not stating the message exactly as it was given.

As it was, he came by machine, and arrived before he was expected. The party was in the city about forty-five minutes, during which time they procured dinner at the White Pelican hotel and drove about the city. They then proceeded on the trip to Crater Lake, desirous of making it last night, owing to the fullness of Mr. Bryan's schedule. He was slated to speak at Medford tonight at 7 o'clock, leaving at 7:15, and his desire to come in by this route made it necessary to proceed as rapidly as possible. Tomorrow he speaks at Albany.
