

KLAMATH INDIANS TELL OF RECORD

PROMINENT KLAMATH SIGN AN
ARTICLE TO PUBLIC TO FORK-
STALL ERRONEOUS OPINIONS
THAT MIGHT BE FORMED

To the Public:

We, whose names are signed to this paper, are Klamath Indians. We have just witnessed an examination before Justice Gowen which has resulted in finding Joseph Brown, an Umpqua Indian, over to the U. S. court in Portland for stabbing to death our fellow tribesman, Eugene Isaacs. The cause of this homicide was a quarrel over the right of way through the said Joseph Brown's allotment, and was not the result of intoxicating liquor, which has been the cause of several homicides during the last few years.

We know that under the law, which we all wish to see enforced, we can say nothing that would influence public opinion, for this case must come to trial and be decided on the evidence then produced, but we wish to let the people know what our attitude is in such matters, and that we are not a people who are murderous in our character, but that our desire is to obey the law and live as becomes honorable American people, loving peace and quiet, and who wish to be respected as the loyal subjects of a government we are proud to honor and obey. In this case, we do not wish to reflect on anyone, nor assert that the authorities should have acted promptly in settling this question of the right of way, if the case had been presented to them before this occurrence, but when there are reasons for difference in such cases they should be promptly reported for adjustment to the superintendent, and he should, of course, act with promptness, so as to prevent as far as possible troubles that may result seriously between individuals.

One signer of this paper is a brother of the man lately killed. Their father, Isaac Nekobux, was a law-abiding man and a Christian—one who taught his children to respect the law, and never to resort to the old, bloody methods of settling disputes, which were common in the days before the white man's law and the Christian religion became our guides. This signer, Simon Isaacs, now feels a spirit of revenge against the man

who took his brother's life, and his only wish is to see the true facts brought forth in the trial and the law honestly enforced.

We believe the record will show that we are not a bloody people. The great treaty which was made in October, 1864, which gave us the Klamath reservation as our heritage, bound us to the observance of the white man's law. Since then about twelve

homicides have occurred on the reservation. Is this a bad record for over a thousand people in over fifty-one years?

Half of these murders were directly due to the influence of alcoholic drinks, something which was introduced into the country by white people, along with the great advantages they brought to the red man. Two of the homicides were by a madman, one

the result of Indian superstition, two premeditated assassinations, and one the killing of an Indian by an angry white man who was grazing his stock on Indian land, and who resented the Indian's defense of his own property. Five men who were guilty of these murders were not by blood Klamath Indians.

In conclusion, we only wish to say to the white people, and to our own

people as well, let us live in peace and observe the law; treat all men honestly; be slow to anger, but quick to do our duty as men who wish to live in peace, and become honorable American citizens. (Signed) SARGENT BROWN, GARFIELD JACK, SIMON ISAACS, STONEWALL JACKSON.

TWO TESTS FOR ANY CIGARETTE

The taste of the cigarette—according to a leading tobacco journal—is up to the smoker. But there are other qualities that you should look for in the cigarette that you are going to stick to for your steady smoke. Here are a couple of tests that may help the average smoker to choose more wisely between different kinds of cigarettes.

The first test is for coolness, which means more comfort to the throat and tongue. Light any cigarette. Draw in a cloud of smoke—a small, ordinary puff is not sufficient to make this test. Hold it in your mouth for a few seconds. Let it "float" around against your tongue and throat. Now blow out the smoke.
