### BENSON ADVISES SOME ROAD WORK

OF LA PINE SHOULD BE DONE THIS FALL OR WINTER. HIGHWAY ENGINEER TO GIVE LINE

The following letter from S. Benson of Portland, prominent road builder of Oregon, received by Dr. Johnson, president of the Commercial Club of this city, in regard to road conditions in this county, points out that some work should be done on the road south of La Pine owing to trees in the road and the crookedness of the highway.

He also advises that a line be established by the state highway engineer so that the work would not be thrown away. He states that this is all that is necessary to put this road in good shape. Following is his letter:

"On my trip north from Klamath Falls to Bend I found that there is a large volume of California travel south by way of Lakeview. I lay this to the fact that the road in your county from La Pine south for some distance is partly obstructed by trees and is very crooked. This can be remedied at a very small expense. I would advise that you see your county court, and get them in touch with the state highway engineer's office, and have a line located on permanent survey, in order that the work done will not be thrown away, and the trees on the right of way should be removed, which is about all the work needed to put this road in fair condition for travel.

"The people around Crater seem very much interested in this, and will assist you. Some of your county funds should be spent on this end of the road this fall or winter if possible.

"The road from Bend north is in fairly good condition, as you will know, when we drove 201 miles in one day from Bend north."

### KAISER REALIZED MAXIM YEARS AGO

SIR HIRAM MAXIM TELLS IN LONDON HOW GERMAN EMPEROR SAW THE POSSIBILITIES OF THE GUN

LONDON, July 20.—How Emperor Wilhelm foresaw twenty years ago the possibilities of the Maxim gun, now so prominent in war reports, and ordered vast quantities of this death-dealing weapon, was told here today for the first time by Sir Hiram Maxim the aged American inventor.

Today the German army has approximately 55,000 of these machine guns, and the British government and other governments are making them as fast as they can, all of which proves that the day of the single shot rifle is past in modern warfare, says Sir Hiram.

It was Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, later King Edward, who called the Kaiser's attention to the Maxim gun, says the inventor. The king was on a visit to his imperial nephew when one day he inquired casually of Wilhelm if he had chanced to notice the Maxim gun. The Kaiser acknowledged that he had not, but declared his interest when told it could fire bullets at the rate of 600 a minute.

There happened to be one of the newly invented Maxims on a range not far from the palace, and together the Kaiser and the prince went to the range to watch it perform. Sir Hiram, who was present, adds:

Orders were sent to have everything ready, and when the Kaiser and the prince visited the grounds they found four machine guns and four big targets at a distance of 200 metres. The old Gatling gun was first fired. It was very heavy and had six barrels. The Nordenfeldt five-barrel gun was also fired, and the two-barrel Gardiner. It required four men to serve each gun, and when they attempted to work the guns too rapidly

they seemed to jam. They got through with 150 to 200 rounds a minute. One man, an experienced gunner, then sat on the tail of the little Maxim gun, carefully adjusted the sights, pulled the trigger, and 333 rounds went off in slightly over half a minute. (The Maxim gun is loaded and fired by its own recoil.) The Kaiser and prince then walked down and examined the targets. The hits made by the hand-worked machines were scattered all over the place. These guns had been disturbed by the working of the cranks and levers, whereas the Maxim not being interfered with by an external force, had made nearly all hits in the bullseye or close to it.

"When the Kaiser returned he placed his finger on the Maxim gun and said: 'That is the gun; there is no other.' He then caused orders to be given to turn out these guns very rapidly and in vast quantities, and they are now making history, very much to our cost.

"If we wish to beat the Germans at their own game, it is necessary to be supplied with a great number of automatic machine guns."

Sir Hiram first began work on the automatic gun in 1881, when he was chief engineer and electrician of the United States Lighting company of New York. He later exhibited his invention before officials in France and England, and after a more perfect machine had been made he took it to Germany, where the Kaiser was the first to recognize its value.

In his statement, Sir Hiram says: "In the war between Russia and Japan two-thirds of all the casualties among the Japanese were caused by Maxim guns, and in the present war the most important arm is without doubt the automatic machine gun, firing rifle cartridges. It is fast supplanting the old hand rifle.

It is with this weapon that a thin line of Germans, stretching across the continent, is able to hold back the French and English, while vast hordes of the Kaiser's men are driving back the Russians on the eastern front.

Another Gunboat to Haytien

WASHINGTON, July 20.—The United States gunboat Nashville has been ordered to Cape Haytien to reinforce the Eagle. It has been announced by the navy department. The situation at Haytien is reported as quiet.

### CITY IN HANDS OF A RECEIVER

FOR SECOND TIME IN HISTORY NASHVILLE IS TURNED OVER TO RECEIVER—DISAPPEARANCE OF RECORDS IS CAUSE

NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 20.—Chancellor Allison has appointed Robert Vaughn a master in chancery receiver for the city of Nashville, and Circuit Judge Mathews, acting under Tennessee's "ouster law," suspended from office Mayor Hilary E. Brown and Commissioners Robert Elliott and Lyle Andrews.

Andrews, Controller Miles Brown, Treasurer Charles Meyers and Auditor Treasurer W. H. West are under indictment in connection with the disappearance of records. West's whereabouts is unknown. It is said the city's credit is not involved, the movement being directed only against officials for alleged misconduct.
