

OFFERS TO RESTORE OLD LIBERTY BELL

MANAGER OF SAN DIEGO GARAGE
DISCLOSES HE CAN RESTORE
BELL BY WELDING CRACK IN
THE HISTORIC RELIC

SAN DIEGO, July 31.—The board of public works of Philadelphia has under consideration the offer of Stuart Hutcheon, manager of a local garage, to weld the crack in the famous Liberty Bell in such a manner that its tone will be restored, when the bell reaches the San Diego exposition.

"We will weld the bell," said the offer of Hutcheon, "in such a manner that it will not only have the crack filled in perfectly, but so that it may be rung with the clearness of any bell of its size and weight. By having it welded you will undoubtedly perpetuate the clarion tone of the Liberty Bell to untold thousands of people."

The offer guarantees that the bell will not be injured and the work is to be a donation to the nation.

Mayer Bankenburg, in a letter to Hutcheon, notifies him that the board of public works is carefully considering his offer.

STRAHORN WOULD TACKLE KLAMATH

MIGHT BE INDUCED TO INVESTIGATE THIS COUNTRY MORE THOROUGHLY, AS HE IS FIGURING ON TAKING UP SOMETHING

PORTLAND, July 31.—Robert E. Strahorn, railroad builder, who fathered the Portland, Eugene & Eastern electrification project and the North Coast line, is back in Portland from his home at Spokane. He is studying, consulting, figuring. He believes he still has some of the old-time punch to do some good for Portland and the undeveloped regions of the state that are waiting for a railroad to grow into populous and fruitful communities.

Mr. Strahorn has several plans in mind. Until they mature he declared that he could not say which one would be tackled first.

"If I were as young now as I was when I started railroad building," he said, "I think I could develop Central Oregon a good deal. Klamath and Lake counties ought to belong to Portland. The Southern Pacific has now reached the difficult part of its construction work toward that country. South of Eugene its line is in a canyon, and any extensions it would make must remain in the canyon—not a highly developed factor."

"By going after Klamath county from the northeast, however, the same benefit would accrue to Southern Oregon by putting it into touch with



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Portland, and Central Oregon could be opened up as well. Besides that line can be built more cheaply.

"Whoever attacks the railroad extension problem in Oregon from now on must look after general development as well. The soda lakes, the timber, irrigation, agriculture, power development, all are now transportation problems. These must be worked out by the same mind that attempts the railroad."

When he was informed that the O. W. R. & N. Co. had awarded contracts for the extension of the Oregon Eastern from Riverton thirty miles westward through Harney Valley, Mr. Strahorn expressed great pleasure.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, July 30.—The slow advance of the Germans since they crossed the Barrow River is causing uneasiness in Berlin. Although nearly a week has elapsed the Teutons have not been able to appreciably advance over the few miles separating the Narve and the Bug.

The German general staff must have been confused by the ability of the Russians to hold the plains between the Bug and the Narve, and it is probable that far more men were required to throw back the Slavs in this region than the Germans originally provided. Five offensives were attempted at the outset of the Warsaw campaign; one in the Baltic provinces; one against Warsaw itself; a third against Lvov, and others against the Lublin-Chelm railway and in Eastern Galicia. Three of these offensives are now halted. Only the Warsaw and the Lublin-Chelm operations are being persistently pushed.

The Russians have the same advantage in defending Warsaw that the Germans hold on the western front in the possession of inner lines of communications. The German front from the Narve to the Lublin-Chelm railway is in a half circle of 200 miles. The Slavs, however, have the inside of the circle, and can move from one end to the other along a line half as long.

The Russians have the better railways, and thus the Germans do not possess means of concentrating more rapidly than the Slavs.

WILSON MAY BE SENT HOME SOON

INFORMAL DIPLOMATIC EXCHANGES MAY SECURE HIS RELEASE—HINT OF BRIBERY FOR FORGED PASSPORT IS OUT

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 31.—It was understood today that there will be informal diplomatic exchanges with Germany regarding Harry Wilson of Portland, Ore., clerk to the American consul general in Berlin, arrested on a charge of having falsely issued an American passport to an Englishman who left for England.

The administration is expected to do everything in its power unofficially simply to have Wilson sent home. A German guilty of Wilson's offense would be charged with treason. Wilson's discharge from the government service, should he be released and permitted to return to this country is certain.

The administration has no confirmation of rumors that Wilson cabled his wife \$1,200 from Germany before he attempted to leave the country. Officials are hopeful that the German authorities will release him as a matter of courtesy, providing he leaves the country immediately, though it was admitted that this would place the United States under an embarrassing obligation.

Jewish Chautauqua
SAN FRANCISCO, July 31.—Prominent Jews of the Pacific Coast assembled here today for the fifth annual convention of the Jewish Chautauqua. The conference will continue for four days. A varied program has been arranged for the different sessions. Religious and education, religion and social service, and kindred topics will be discussed by prominent speakers. Two sessions will be devoted to the accomplishment of Jewish authors.
