These are reasons back of the idea of the commercial organization. It is this fact that has led to their creation and re-organization on the basis of business operations. And it is found that they pay handsome dividends to the citizens when so organized and conducted.

KLAMATH FANS will have a bunch of outside games a-running, now. It's up to us to see that the visitors are treated right.

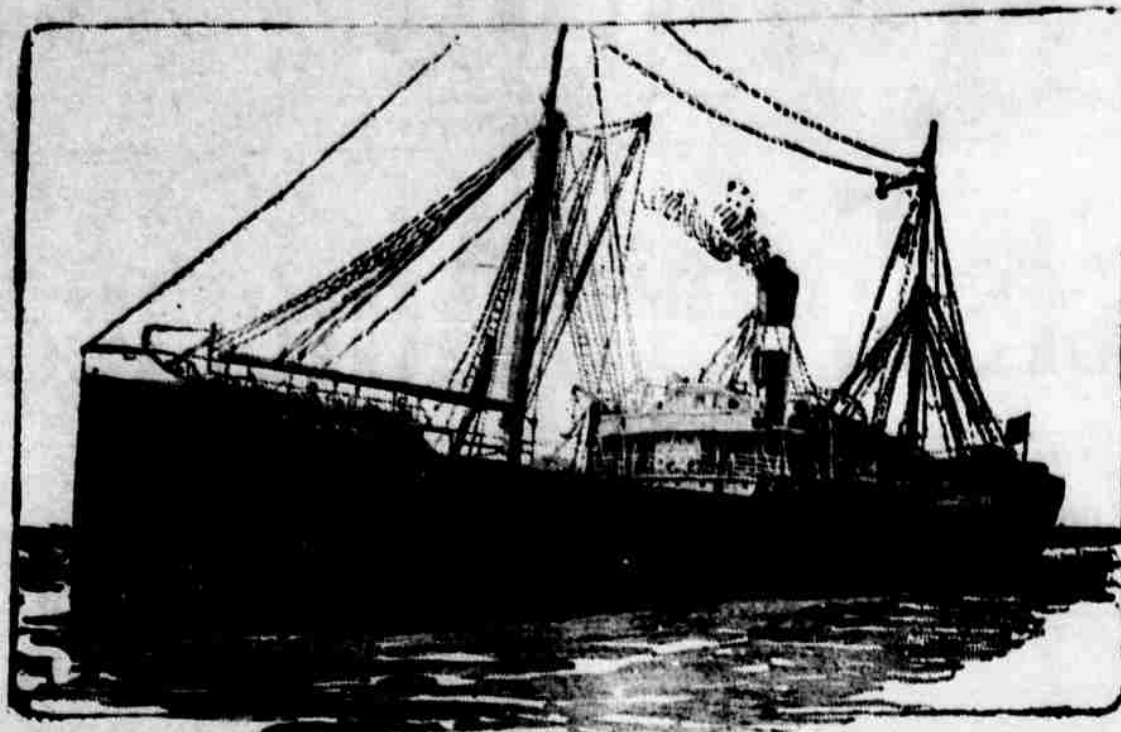
ANY OTHER treatment is rotten.

American Ship Sunk by Submarine



THE LEEANAW

The American ship Leelanaw was sunk by a German submarine off the north coast of Scotland, Sunday, July 25. She had left Galveston May 8 with cotton for Russia, which she unloaded at Archangel. Taking a cargo

of flax, she was boarded by the commander of a German submarine when nearing Scotland. He is said to have given the crew time to get into the boats and then torpedoed the vessel. Thus has been raised the same question as in the case of the William P.

Frye, sunk by the Prinz Eitel Friedrich. The latter was loaded with wheat which the Germans declared contraband. President Wilson has held that the submarine had no right to sink the vessel, whatever might have been done with her cargo.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—A burglar on trial for stealing silver plate pleaded he wanted money to buy government war loan bonds because he was patriotic.

LATE TELEGRAMS

Washington—Caperton has advised that four Haytiens were killed and two wounded in the Thursday night clash. The hospital ship Solace has been ordered to Port-au-Prince from Newport News. The battleship Connecticut, with 655 marines, sailed from Philadelphia Saturday.

Vienna—An official announcement here says: "Austria cavalry entered Lublin Friday night. This is important because this is the key to the railroads serving as lines of communication southeast of Warsaw.

BERLIN—Gerard cables that he has received the German reply regarding the sinking of the steamer Frye.

New York—Saturday was the hottest day of the summer here. Friday night was the hottest night. Six deaths and four suicides took place.

Liverpool—The Orduna arrived here Saturday after taking extraordinary precautions through the danger zone. She had been signagging for the past three mornings out.

Berlin—Mail advices from Constantinople state that a revolution in India is growing out of the prayers of a holy war, and that discontent is being promoted.

Chicago—Mayor Thompson has declared that he would appeal to the president personally if Secretary Redfield whitewashed the federal steamship inspectors of the Eastland.

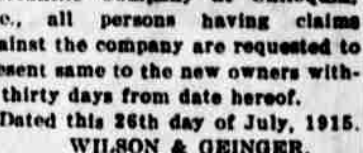

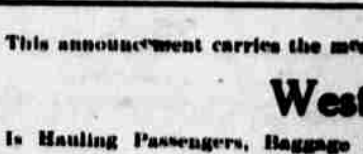

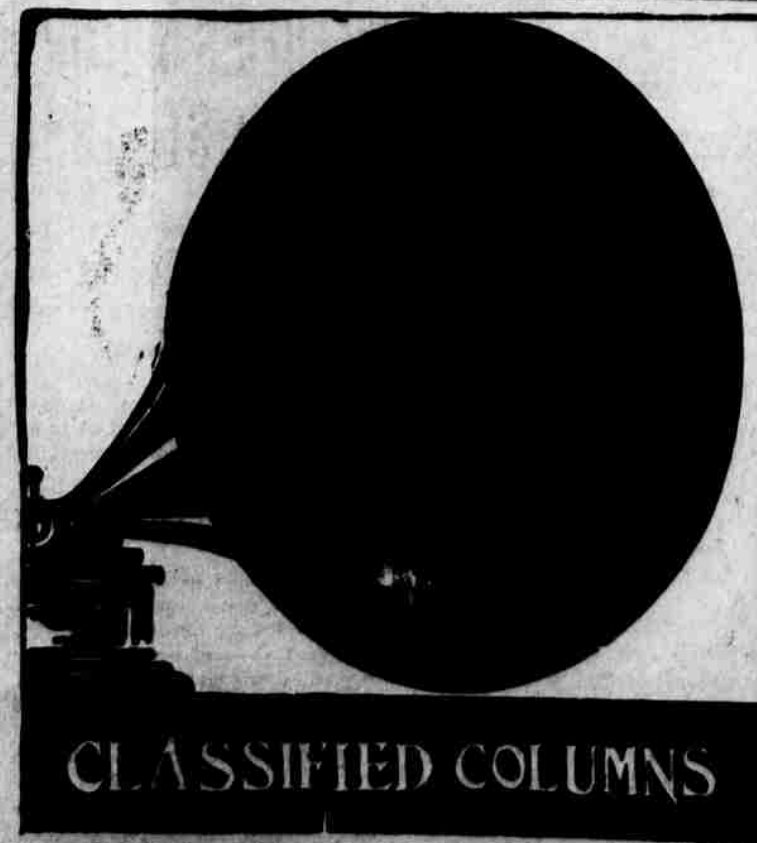
