AUTO OWNERS FILE PETITION FOR FEES

OWNERS OF AUTO RUN IN CITY FOR FEES DESIRE LICENSE AND TAXES LEVIED—PROVIDE HEAVY FINE

A petition was presented the city council last night by a number of auto owners of the city petitioning that owners and operators of cars in the city for hire be subjected to a city license tax or fee of \$25 per year. Proper signs, license tags and registration is to be provided; \$5 is to be charged for a transfer of a license and \$100 fine for a violation. The petition was signed by nearly a dozen local operators. It was placed on file, and the city attorney directed to draw up an ordinance conforming.

The state law recently upheld by the supreme court in reference to the legality of the act of hiring impounded dogs was brought up by Councilman Miller. The city attorney was instructed to investigate the law. The electrical inspection ordinance passed its third reading, and provided the payment of the inspector on a fee system.

An offer was received by the council from F. H. Mills for the sale of lots 4, 5, 6 and 7, in block 9, Klamath addition to Klamath Falls, for \$1,000, where the city pounds are now located.

MANY COLLEGE CREDENTIALS IN

INQUIRIES INDICATE HEAVIER ENROLLMENT NEXT FALL THAN EVER BEFORE AT OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

(Herald Special Service)

CORVALLIS, Aug. 3.—The registrar's office is receiving more college entrance credentials than it received at the corresponding period last year, said H. M. Tennant, in reply to the inquiry as to the outlook for attendance the coming year at O. A. C.

"Reported hard times, combined with the raising of requirements for entrances into the degree courses seem to have made no impression on the prospective student body. A disposition to seek specialization in chosen lines of work is evidently the moving force behind the vast number of inquiries reaching the office, since about double the usual number from students in colleges elsewhere has already been received."

"A feature of the inquiries from prospective vocational students is the increased age of those seeking entrance. It is not at all unusual to receive several inquiries a day from persons of 20 to 40 years of age. A practical, middle aged farmer of the Willamette Valley announces his intention to come and take special work in dairying, going especially into the manufacturing phases of the subject. Another past 40 expects to take work in general agriculture and farm practices. One 38 years of age wants to come and study methods of bee-keeping on the farm. And so it goes along the line, with many seeking to make themselves more proficient in home-making and in offices and shops. Three trained nurses of Portland have also announced their wish to enter and specialize in dietetics and food preparation for invalids.
