RENO, Nev., Aug. 6.—A complaint charging Arthur Highfill, formerly a saloon man of Lakeview, Oregon, with wife desertion has been made to the district attorney by Mrs. Elva Highfill, and a complaint has been issued by that official. Highfill is said to have fled the state, and his present whereabouts are unknown.

Mrs. Highfill says that she and her three children, aged 9, 11 and 13 years respectively, preceded her husband from Lakeview to Reno. He promised to follow them here, and did so, but after selling some of her belongings left them. She is said to be in destitute circumstances.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—A promise from Greece to assist Serbia if Bulgaria tries to seize Serbian Macedonia is the first serious indication that Bulgaria may join the Teutons. Bulgaria has long been on the market for the highest bidder, but her alternatives were thought to have been to join the allies or observe a benevolent neutrality toward Germany and Austria. If the Teutonic victories in the east have caused Bulgaria to believe Germany can win with Bulgarian help the Greek pledge to aid Serbia would not be sufficient to compel Sofia to keep peace.

The military revelations of the Balkan war indicate that Bulgaria would have little difficulty conquering Greece. Greek interference, in fact, would probably cause Bulgaria to cease fighting Serbia and concentrate upon Greece, whose coast line presents more attractive loot. While engaged with Greece, Bulgaria could spare a force to assist the Turks on the Gallipoli peninsula. The uncertainty of the Constantinople campaign might be turned into a Turkish success with the aid of Bulgaria. The allies must quickly give more definite assurance to Czar Ferdinand if Sofia's assistance is to be won from the Teutons.

Bulgaria has stated as plainly as the secrecy of negotiations will allow that she will not fight for the allies unless given a part of Serbian Macedonia, wrested from her during the Balkan war. Serbia is willing to restore a part of Macedonia to Bulgaria providing Serbia gets an Adriatic outlet. The entente is trying to persuade Serbia to cede the Macedonian territory unconditionally.
