were exposed and are holding them back. But those in the timber are ripening fast, and many luscious berries are awaiting the pickers.

The season is just opening, and so far no reports have been brought from the patch at Lake of the Woods and other regions.

## JERUSALEM GETS THE NEWS FIRST

LONDON INCLINED TO DISCREDIT TALES RELATED IN PAPERS FROM THE HOLY LAND IN ADVANCE OF ALL OTHERS

LONDON, Aug. 6.—London people don't believe all they read in the

### Sigma Chi Meets

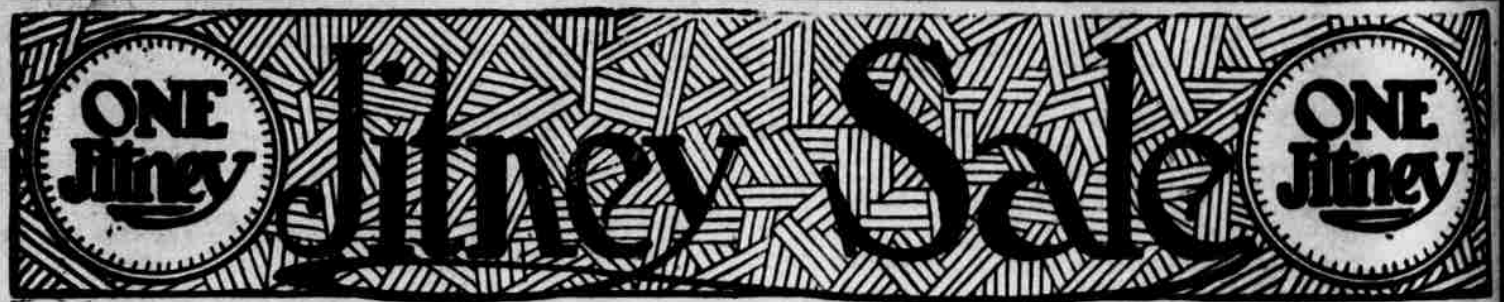

JOHNSON FOR PRESIDENT

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 6.—Progressive republicans seem to take Colonel Roosevelt's remarks in San Francisco the other night as endorsement of Hiram Johnson for progressive candidate for president in 1916. Johnson's victory in California last year made him one of the most talked of political leaders of the country. There is nothing more for him so far as California is concerned, but the United States senatorship, and it would be a violation of California tradition for the state to have two senators from San Francisco, which would be the case if Johnson were chosen.
