

AMERICAN FLYER "CAUSES CONCERN"

FORCED TO LAND ON SEA IN THE
WAR ZONE, THE LAPPING OF
THE WAVES AND GENTLE WIND
SOON LULLS HIM TO SLEEP

ROME, Aug. 7.—While "Glink" Dougherty, young American birdman, slept peacefully in a hydroplane drifting about on the Adriatic, the entire Italian aviation corps at the Tarento naval base searched for some trace of his craft, believing he had encountered Austrian airmen or a submarine.

The story has just reached Rome. Dougherty, whose home is in Buffalo, is an instructor in aeronautics at Tarento. He was on scout duty one morning when word came that an Austrian submarine had been sighted off the coast, and he flew out to reconnoiter at 5 a. m., with a two-hour supply of gasoline in his tank.

The two hours passed and the Buffalo airman failed to return. When four hours had gone by, John Lansing Callan, another American aviator, and a dozen Italian birdmen had their machines wheeled from the hangars and started in search of Dougherty.

For nearly an hour they sped along the coast. Finally, twelve miles out, an Italian sighted a drifting hydroplane, and slid into the water beside it. There sat Dougherty asleep in his seat. After half an hour's flight he had been forced to descend because of carburetor troubles. Something had cast loose and dropped into the water, said Dougherty.

"I had not slept well the night before, and the wind lulled me to sleep almost before I knew it," said the American. "I knew somebody would find me."

On May 23d, by a washout around a dam in the pond 42,390 Hockeye salmon were planted in Spencer Creek.

On July 8 100,000 Rainbow fry were planted in North Sprague River and Merrill Creek, and Superintendent Pollock has just finished planting 307,000 fry in Lake county from the Crane Creek hatchery at Lakewood.

The total number planted amounted to 1,083,785.

"Hell's Hundred" Name Given U. S.-Mexico Line

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 7.—"Hell's Hundred" is what old timers call the 100 miles of Mexican border between Tia Juana and Mexicali, the "two toughest towns" on the American continent.

And on that 100 mile stretch—America's last frontier—a handful of United States inspectors are today fighting a guerilla warfare with scores of white, black and tan smugglers, whose sole object in life is to beat Uncle Sam's custom laws.

Far away from telegraphs and telephones, there are almost daily skirmishes. They never break into the newspapers. Gangs of frightened, sheep-like Chinese are rounded up while the agents attempting to sneak them over the border flee with bullets dropping above them. Desperadoes with automobile cargoes of opium match their motors against the ponies of the inspectors, and again the bullets drone. Battles have been fought in the desert mountains and in the alkaline beds of dried up oceans. Occasionally someone is killed, or a batch of prisoners captured. But the censorship of lonely wastes devoid of telegraph or telephone proves a stronger bar to news than the censorship of Europe.

The war is directed from Los Angeles. "Jack" Elliott, collector of the port of Los Angeles, is commander in chief. He sits in his office and gets reports. He issues secret orders. Sometimes bronzed youths with bandaged hands or heads confer with him seriously. Once every few weeks he sheds his business suit, dons khaki and a sombrero and disappears, to return a while later, sunburned, saddle-sore and determined.

"The boys are doing well," he says. It means volumes. It means that here and there along the empty stretches at "Hell's Hundred" young Americans are slowly trotting their horses, or making their blanket beds with the sky for a roof and the moon for a lamp, shivering by night and sweating by day, always alert for the purr of a distant motor, the flash of light on the horizon that means smugglers—Chinks, and a fight.

Most of the smugglers have their headquarters in Tia Juana, fourteen miles from San Diego, or Mexicali, 100 miles east. Both towns are in the California line. They are utterly beyond all law. Their denizens always face toward California, for to cross the line with contraband means profit.

And between these two outposts of Gehenna and civilized Southern California, with its prosaic jitney buses and its little green bungalows, there is nothing but this thin line of bronzed young horsemen who watch and fight, take bullets and give them, twenty-four hours a day, unknown and unappreciated.

PALE SHINS ARE SIGNS OF DISEASE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 7.—"We are suffering from over-civilization. Centuries ago man built a house, and he has been living in a hole ever since. The modern apartment house, from a hygienic standpoint, is worse than the home of the ancient cave man."

Dr. J. H. Kellogg, president of the Race Betterment Foundation, so declared at the opening session of the National Conference of Race Betterment in session here.

"The pale skin so noticeable today is the badge of disease," said Dr. Kellogg. "Our skins should be brown, like the Indian's. People should live out of doors."

Dr. Kellogg explained to the 200 medical and scientific men who are delegates to the conference, that the purpose of the meeting is to formulate a program to overcome the effects of over-civilization.

Are Jitneys Passing?

PASADENA, Calif., Aug. 7.—Southern California, where the jitney bus first sprouted, seems likely to be the scene of its first withering. If it ever does get into the sere and yellow stage, B. D. Home, one of Pasadena's pioneer bus drivers, has surrendered his license. He says the jitney will soon be only a memory. At one time Home operated an extensive line of buses. But business dwindled until he couldn't make money with one lonely bus.
