WILL CUT THREE CROPS THIS YEAR

KLAMATH COUNTY RANCHERS AWAKE TO THE POSSIBILITIES OF ALFALFA CULTURE AND ARRANGE TO INCREASE OUTPUT

A few years ago any ranch soul who advocated the cultivation of any crop less hardy than rye hay in the Klamath country was given the merry ha-ha and looked on as one who had lost a few bricks from the top of his chimney, or whose marbles had rolled out of the ring. Eventually, however, a few adventurous ones did attempt a little patch of alfalfa, generally planted where it would not be too conspicuous, and when they had demonstrated the feasibility of raising this superb forage crop quite an acreage was given over to its cultivation.

The hope of a second cutting was not what one would call a bright and shining opportunity, however, and its ultimate realization was almost as much of a shock to the calamity jowler as was the successful harvest of a single crop.

Going them one better, the ranchers in the Merrill country are cutting their second crop at this time. In order to get the third cutting this year, and the experienced ranchers and cattlemen of that vicinity say that not only is the third cutting assured, but that the hay is of a superior quality to that where only two cuttings are made. The first cutting was made between the middle and last of June, and the second is now on, while the third will be about six weeks later, still allowing a long period of pasture on the land.

A LITTLE SPORTING GOSSIP SERVANT GIRLS ARE THE VICTIMS

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The Giants are not yet out of the dash for the National League pennant. McGraw's team, thought to be shot, has showed a burst of speed the past week that augurs ill for the Phils and Braves when the teams turn into the September home stretch. The rampant slugging of the Giants must make them respected. As a matter of fact, however, but one team can really be declared out, and that is Charley Herzog's rumpus Reds.

Never in the history of baseball have seven teams swept through August so closely bunched as this year. But four games separate the seventh place and the leading Phils, and any club that can win four or five games in a row is not only going to look good, but it is going to look like a good bet to cop the flag. A short winning streak will send any of them out in front, and once out, they're going to be mighty hard to catch.

Boston's chances, it might be said, depend to a large extent on whether Johnny Evers can keep his temper and stay in the game.

On Wednesday of last week the Braves had won fifteen out of their last eighteen games, and the dopsters began figuring out their seats for the big show in Beantown. On Wednesday, however, Johnny got in a scrap with Fred Clarke at Pittsburgh, and drew a three day suspension. The Braves didn't win a game the rest of the week. It's not a coincidence, it's a fact, that the Braves can't develop a winning habit without the little Trojan. They didn't start on that fifteen game streak until Evers got back in the game. Their whole defense and offense is built about him, more so than ever this year, with Stallings forced to get along without the services of the famous Rudolph-Tyler-James trio.

The Dodgers lost a large part of their pennant hopes when they took the road. Before starting west they had developed a nice little winning streak, but the western clubs soon showed them where it was all wrong for them to win.

The Cubs are considered by many baseball men to be the dark horses of

the league. At times Brennan's club looks like a world beater, and again like a bunch of busters. The same might be said for the Cardinals. The Pirates haven't shown consistently enough to be really dangerous contenders.

It's anybody's old pennant yet, and the devil take the hindmost.

There were practically no changes in the American League race—except that the White Sox chances look a little more raveled out than heretofore.

It looks like Boston and Detroit to come into September fighting for the lead. Boston has the edge in eastern betting circles, due to the all-around balance of the club, but if Hughie Jennings succeeds in getting another A-1 pitcher, which he is after, there are going to be a lot of changed bets.

Each club won a double header on Saturday.

The White Sox are a disappointment. They have the strongest club in the league, on paper—Charley Comiskey has spent thousands of dollars to make a winner, buying players that have proved their worth, instead of young phenoms, who have yet to win their spurs in the big show—and yet the team lacks the punch that makes a winner. Eddie Collins was bought for \$50,000; Eddie Murphy for \$10,000; Nemo Liebold for \$15,000; besides a whole raft of younger players, without apparently getting results.

California Behind Times

"There is every disposition to treat the insane as if they were criminals," said Dr. Holshold. "Physicians and not police officers should care for the insane who may be held for examination."

ACCORDING TO STATEMENTS BY PROMINENT CLUB WOMEN IN ADDRESSES MADE BEFORE INTERESTED AUDIENCES

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—Declaring that 70 per cent of the women of the underworld are servant girls driven there by cruel American housewives, Mrs. M. L. Carpenter, chairman of the Federated Club Women of Chicago, said today that the average housewife was a worse slave-driver than the Southern plantation owner of the slavery days. She spoke before the Department of Labor conference on employment in session here.

Mrs. Carpenter, who spent nine months posing as a servant to obtain information concerning the servant problem, declared her findings were almost unbelievable.

"I found that hundreds of girls are ruined by husbands and some of these cruel housewives and driven into the streets," declared Mrs. Carpenter. "Others are forced into a life of shame by crooked employment bureaus."

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 10.—The fall of Ivangorod, the fortress guarding Warsaw on the southeast, is a military complement to the capture of Warsaw. The fall of this great Polish capital and the taking of the Ivangorod fortress, is part of the greater German campaign whose objective is the obliteration of the field forces of Russia.

Although the capture of the Vistula line is no end in itself, it must be regarded as the war's greatest success, as one of the supreme military achievements in all world's history. The immensity of the accomplishment is due to the fact that the miracle was wrought with only part of the Teutonic power. Germany is holding England and France in hand; Austria is presenting an impregnable front along the Italian border. Yet the Teutonic forces have enough excess strength to capture the principal Slav strongholds. It is this that makes the victory rank almost with those of the combats of the legendary Titans.

The belief held in London that the Germans will concentrate its forces about Calais will probably prove unfounded. The evident purpose of the present Teutonic strategy is to force Russia to quit the field. It would be short sightedness on the part of the Teutons to abandon the eastern offensive now as it would have been to quit after the fall of Lemberg. The depression among the normally pessimistic Slavs increases with each Teutonic victory. The lack of ammunition does not explain the continuous Russian retreat since the first day of May.

The frightful strain of the year's fighting is undoubtedly beginning to undermine the Slav morale. The Teutons believe that this will cause Russia's complete collapse in the near future.

The western lines are not as pierceable as the eastern. In fact, it is doubtful whether it is breakable at all inasmuch as the British and the French are better prepared and better manned than the Russians. At the same time the Westerners having been saving ammunition since the eastern drive began in order to meet possible offensive attacks against themselves. They are rested and are today ready for the greatest possible defensive combat.

To force a separate peace with Russia it will probably continue to be the Kaiser's purpose.

INDIAN CHOOSES WHITE MAN'S LAW

AND GOES TO JAIL FOR KILLING HIS OPPONENT IN A DUEL FOUGHT UNDER OLD INDIAN CUSTOM

SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—Quilless under Indian law, but convicted by the white man's law, Indian Jim, an aborigine of Knik, Alaska, declared, "White man's law is best," and today was committed to the federal prison on McNeill's island for three years for killing Chief Stephan of the Nihiloff tribe.

The men fought a duel in the wilderness, 140 miles from Knik last November for the possession of a remote and almost inaccessible district where both had come to trap. Indian Jim got there first.

With the help of his son and the slain chief's widow and daughter, Indian Jim strapped the corpse to a sled and rushed to Knik, where he gave himself up to the authorities. Judged by the Indian law, Jim was justified. He could have buried the body and Indians themselves would not have given him over to the white man's justice. But he obeyed the white man's law. An effort will be made to have him pardoned.
