TIME FOR ACTION

THE time has arrived when action must be taken by Klamath county on the proposed displaying of motion pictures of this county at the Panama-Pacific Exposition at San Francisco. It is high time the pictures were being prepared and shown, if they are to be of any use at the fair. Their value afterwards will cover the initial cost, but they will undoubtedly reach a larger number of persons at the fair than any other means, and a multitude of people that are looking for just such things—a new location in the West.

Word has been received from Bonanza that a goodly amount can be secured there. Word has also been received from Fort Klamath that a larger amount can be secured there. The matter of raising the money is now being taken up by the Commercial Club, and all the support possible should be given, as the value of a real film of the Klamath country at the fair, and later over the entire country, will be written in dollars and cents to us.

The "movie" will accurately show the nature of this country, and by a judicious mapping out of the county, the various industries that are back of this country can be shown to the best advantage. As a matter of fact, there are but few of the industries of this country that are developed to any great degree, most of them being practically in the embryo state.

That leaves open a point to our advantage. We have progressed far enough to show what can be done and to show the possibilities of the future. Now all we have to do is to show people of other regions what we have, the possibilities of the future, where a man with good judgment and business ability, with a small amount of capital, can invest here in any one of a number of projects, and within a few years, by dint of good management, a profitable industry will result. Just such incidents have taken place here during the past few years, and there are many now that are in this stage of development.

This is what appeals to the man that is looking for a new location. One that has been a success so far in his chosen work, but for any of a number of reasons is looking for a new location, where the future holds forth for greater things, or, perhaps, he just wants a change.

Klamath is at that stage where the builder and developer can step in and be on the ground floor. Every indication points to a wonderful future that is not far away. The more we do to bring that future to us sooner, the more it is to our advantage. We do not realize it, but the possibilities of this country are untold and unrealized by many who live here. We are so accustomed to the familiar things about us that are to spring into budding enterprise that mean prosperity and happiness, that we hardly realize their great significance. But it is coming.

Klamath has had her setbacks, but if we knew the conditions in other places we would find out that Klamath is not nearly so far back, and it will not take her so long to recover, as many other sections of the country. What we should look to is the future, for it holds forth something that when it comes will swoop down upon us so rapidly that we will be taken unawares. We have resources that must be developed, and to do
