Tablet for Lucy Stone House ORANGE, N. J., Aug. 18.—Lucy Stone's old home, which stands in the Italian section of Orange, was the meeting place today of the generals of the four woman suffrage armies of the states of New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts.

The house standing at Huribut street, Orange, is regarded as the Boston Bay of American women, for it was here that Lucy Stone, in 1897, made her famous protest against taxation without representation. As the protest took place before the days of the automobile or other similar luxuries, the rude arm of the law entered the home and took Baby Alice Stone Blackwell's cradle.

The house, fronted by a well kept garden and fenced in, is now the home of one Mathew Masal, an Italian druggist, who has a wife and three children, and whose chief pride is in his garden. When asked if he was in favor of woman suffrage, "I vote yes, certain," said he. "Lady talk Italian, she say Masal and Garibaldi believe freedom good for women. This good country; women ask, men give and make folk happy."

When asked if his wife would give the bambino's cradle for the vote, "No, no, no! Me vote instead. My wife she like to vote, but no lose cradle."

What the War Moves Mean

MASON (Staff Correspondent United Press) NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The quiet apparent in Berlin is due to the possibility that the diplomatic struggle among the Balkans will rapidly reach a climax favorable to the allies. Nevertheless, all indications are that Teutonic good fortune may continue and that the three neutral Balkan nations will be prevented from entering the war.

The dispatches make no mention of the allies attempting to influence Rumania. Representatives of the allied nations are evidently continuing their attention to Bulgaria and Greece. The success of the Germans in Russia and Galicia which has permitted the Teutonic forces to mass against Rumania's flank and rear, probably compelled the authorities at Bucharest to refuse to consider intervention now. The impression is prevalent now that the Rumanians are not as willing to consider intervention as when the Russians were in Carpathia.

If Bulgaria and Greece decide to join forces with the allies while Rumania remains neutral, a possibility exists that the Teutons will advance into Bulgaria from Hungary, and thus paralyze the new offensive against Turkey. But with Rumania's army ready to threaten the rear of the German forces, it is improbable that the Teutons would consider such a move. The allies made a serious blunder when they refused to pay the intervention price demanded by the three neutral Balkan states before the Russians were beaten.
