Klamath Schools Show Great Progress in Year

COMPARISON OF TWO PAST YEARS SHOW STEADY ADVANCEMENT IN SCHOOLS—AN INCREASE IN THE NUMBER OF STUDENTS, MORE BUILDINGS AND MORE TEACHERS, INDICATING A STEADY GROWTH IN THE EDUCATIONAL FIELD

The following annual county report of the schools of Klamath county has been completed by County Superintendent Fred Peterson and has been sent to the state superintendent.

Almost every item in the report shows a healthy condition of schools of the county. The rural schools in particular have made great progress in the last few years. The school houses are nearly all modern, and with one or two exceptions measure up to the state standard. The salaries are better than ever, and the teachers possess a higher grade of qualifications than ever before.

Table comparing 1914 and 1915 statistics: Number persons between ages 4 and 20 (3,547 vs 3,713), Total attendance of county (1,916 vs 2,313), Number of teachers employed in county (91 vs 99), etc.

MILES COMPANY OF THIS CITY IS AWARDED SECOND PRIZE IN NATIONAL CONTEST ON OUT-DOOR POSTER BOARDS

The Miles Sign company of this city received notification recently that it had been awarded second prize in the national contest conducted by the Poster Advertising Association relative to construction and upkeep of outdoor poster boards.

The Poster Advertising Association, an organization composed of outdoor advertisers and covering the entire United States, announced early in the spring that cash prizes would be awarded to poster advertising plants that were rebuilt according to the plans and specifications laid out by the Association, which plans and specifications call for, among other things, steel pannelled display boards.

The local concern at this time was rebuilding the local plant, and entered into the contest, with the result that out of several hundred towns entered, it won second prize.
