OUR COUNTRY

THAT Klamath Falls has surrounding it a country that is different from any other section in the elements of its make-up; that it abounds in good farming land, good scenery, good natural attractions that are wonders in themselves, was truly attested to last night by a noted visitor in our midst.

Mr. Gilbert H. Grosvenor, editor of the National Geographic magazine and director of the National Geographic Society, one of the greatest educational magazines and societies in the world, has paid high tribute to our Lava Beds after a visit there.

"It is a wonderful country," said Mr. Grosvenor. "Different than anything I have ever seen before. I have been abroad many times, but this is my first trip West."

He spoke highly of the farms on the road between this city and that section, and could not praise them enough, stating that to an Easterner they are "simply great." He anticipated greatly a trip today to Harri-man Lodge and the next day to Crater Lake.

FAITH

FAITH is the greatest asset a country can have. Colonel W. H. Holabird, one of the first big developers of this country stated last night that he has not "lost faith in this country by any means," since he has become actively engaged in business in other sections.

He told them of the great work in the Imperial Valley, where the weather is so hot that he himself cannot see how the people stand it, yet are, and are producing products that astonish.

More of this attitude in Klamath county and Klamath Falls would improve this city 50 per cent in a short time. In these times of war and stress in other countries, when shipping and the natural channels of commerce are disrupted and uncertain. When insurance companies are demanding high rates of risk and when, after all, the money that is coming into this country for war munitions and other supplies is circulating in but a narrow circle in comparison with the great interests we have, faith in our country is what we need. It is the backbone of all enterprises, and unfaltering faith has put through greater and larger projects that without it would have failed utterly.

Faith in our railroad was misplaced once, but now that we look the situation over, perhaps it was not so bad after all. But faith in the future, coupled with work and determination that are not allowed to rest, is going to bring us what we desire. Faith must be coupled up with that old, homely word, "plug." Just plain "plug," and keep "plugging" until our ends are obtained. No advance can or will be made under any other conditions.

We must have the right attitude, and when a proposition comes up, look it in the face and not smirk and make a disheartened retort on the subject. Such an attitude, such a frame of mind, would stop anything.

ARTESIAN WELLS SHOW DECREASE

IN WOOD RIVER VALLEY, WHERE SEVENTY WELLS ARE FLOWING—REGULATION OF FLOW WOULD IMPROVE MATTERS

FORT KLAMATH, Aug. 18.—The artesian wells of Fort Klamath and vicinity, which have always been the pride of the Wood River Valley, and which have always delivered an abundance of water, may in the hour of the greatest need prove faithless, as indications point that they may all go dry. There are between sixty and seventy-five wells in Wood River Valley, all of a two-inch size pipe or larger, and they have been spouting volumes of water. In the winter the water never freezes, affording drink for stock, and in the summer they water many gardens, supply hot and cold water and sewer drainage for homes, besides their inestimable value as a pure drinking water supply.

All the wells, or nearly all, now show a diminished flow. Some wells are too weak to force their way through the hot water tanks, as for example, the one of Richard Melhase. This well flows freely in the yard, but will not run in the house. The well at the school house is practically dry. The wells of James Gordon and A. A. Soule went completely dry

on the 16th inst. These wells were 140 feet deep, with a four or five-foot flow.

Considerable speculation as to the cause of the wells going dry has been indulged in. Some think that possibly the digging of wells in the Indian territory of Klamath Marsh might tap the fountain head of the artesian supply. Others think that on account of the wells being allowed to flow continually the supply is becoming exhausted. Still others believe that it is merely the consequence of the hot dry summer, and still others claim that the new well just finished by Wimer & Son at their blacksmith shop, which is 165 feet deep and has a flow of nine feet in height, may be the cause, withdrawing the supply from shallower wells. It seems as though there should be a law regulating the use of artesian water. The wanton waste of it is evidently leading to a weakened fountain supply.

Albert Macquire is at Dr. Soule's place with his steam well digging outfit, and he is going to sink the well deeper. "Mac" guarantees good artesian water, even if he has to go so deep as to startle our antipodes, the Chinamen.

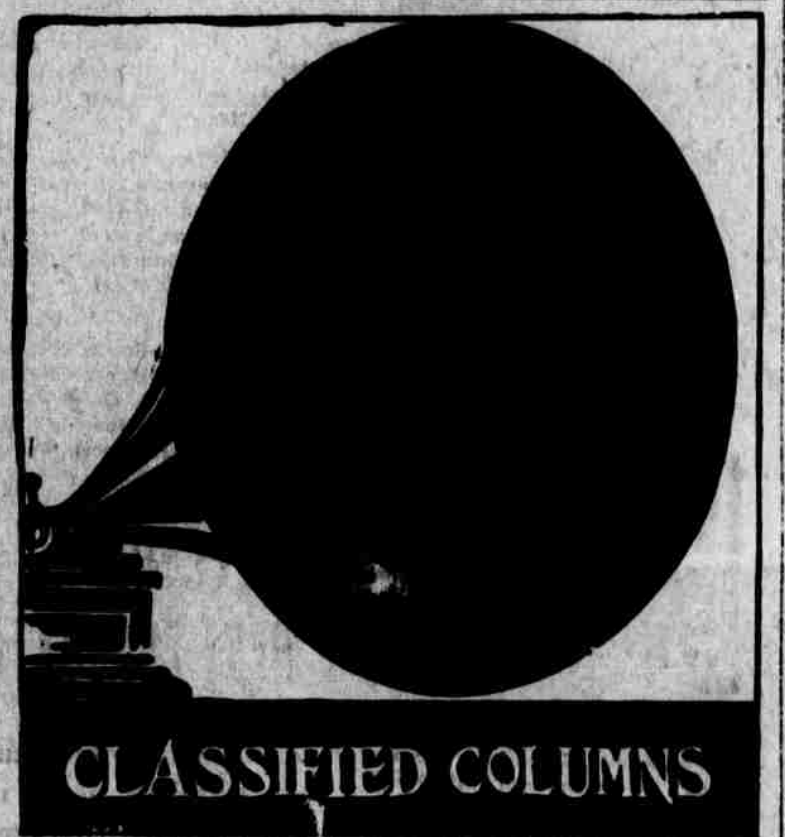
