GIRLS LOSE THEIR FLOATING HOME

AFTER OCCUPYING OLD SHIP AS LIVING QUARTERS FOR MANY YEARS, WORKING GIRLS ARE FORCED TO MOVE

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The old ship Jacob A. Stabler was due to be abandoned today by the fifty working girls who have made it their home for some years. The vessel, moored in East River, near the foot of Twenty-third street, is needed for other purposes by the Arbuckle estate, which owns it.

The girls have a sentimental attachment to the ship where they have lived long and been happy, and the prospect of moving also means a serious financial problem. On the Jacob Stabler charges for board have ranged from \$2.50 to \$3.50, and the girls say they can't get accommodations elsewhere for that amount. Some of them earn only \$4 a week, and none more than \$7 or \$8. Some are out of work.

Fifty-nine years ago the sailing ship Jacob A. Stabler was one of the largest passenger vessels plying between New York and Havre, France. Later she took cargoes to and from nearly every large port in the world. John A. Arbuckle, the coffee king, purchased her in 1901 and turned her into a traveling hotel, making nightly trips from the Battery to Sandy Hook.

In recent years she has been moored at East Twenty-third street and maintained, with the yacht Glitana as a floating dormitory for women at the expense of the Arbuckle heirs.

Frank D. Sheeley has been skipper, mate, pilot and foster-parent for the "crew" of the ship. His wife is called "mother" by the girls, and really acts in somewhat that relation to them.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—The German offensive in Poland is being effectively checked on both flanks, and indications are abundant that the Teutonic attack is weakening. Field Marshal von Hindenburg, particularly, is not doing the work to which he was assigned. The Russians have rallied in exceptional strength against him, not only because he threatens Riga and the entire Baltic coast, but also threatens to isolate Petrograd, should he be successful.

Shortage of ammunition is now hampering the Germans. Novo Georgievsk and Kovno continue to hold out, although neither of these fortresses has the resisting power possessed by Antwerp.

The Teutons are unquestionably storing their new ammunition to resist a possible offensive on the west. The Galician drive and the capture of Warsaw used up most of the winter and spring accumulation of munitions, and not even the Germans can produce ammunition as quickly as it is shot.

Intervals of comparative inactivity are necessary to permit the munition factories to catch up. One is now happening in Russia. The Germans are waiting for shells, and simultaneously must subordinate the eastern demands to the necessity of increasing the reserve along the western front.

The Russians must be praised for the stubbornness they have shown in resisting the Germans. There is no evidence of demoralization, and if the eastern conflict should be fought to a finish it is apparent the Teutons would be near exhaustion themselves in the end. The Russian genius for defensive rather than offensive was never better exemplified.

EVENTS IN THE WAR ONE YEAR AGO TODAY

Brussels declares German advance on that city is stopped. Germans abandon Sarrebourg. French report steady progress in Alsace-Lorraine, the enemy retreating. Serbia reports a victory over a large force of Austrians, saying the latter lost 15,000 men and fourteen big guns. The landing of 100,000 British in France is announced. The Kaiser, leaving for the front, predicts German victory. Japan promises, through her premier, to confine her operations to the China Sea. President Wilson issued proclamation advising observance of the spirit of neutrality.

Chicago, Aug. 18.—General John Black, ex-commander of the G. A. R. and ex-commissioner of pensions died here today.

Vienna, Aug. 18.—It is announced here that General von Eichborn and his German troops have stormed the forts defending Kovno. Three forts northwest of Novo Georgievsk have also been stormed.

Washington, Aug. 18.—The American reply to Germany's proposal regarding the sinking of the schooner William Fry, and submitting of it to the Hague Tribunal has been published. It agrees to the German plan, "each designating experts to fix the amount of indemnity."

Athens, Aug. 18.—The king has accepted Governor's resignation and has invited Premier Venizelos to a conference, probably to form a new ministry.

St. Louis, Aug. 18.—Benjamin F. Bush has been appointed receiver of the Iron Mountain and Missouri Pacific railroad system.

Portland, Aug. 18.—Federal Judge Bean instructed a verdict of acquittal yesterday afternoon in favor of Thos. R. Bilyou, one of the seven defendants in the United States Cashier case, charged with using the mails to defraud. The six other cases are now being tried.

Bryan, former Secretary of State, was the principal speaker here today at the dedication of Weaver Park, the old homestead of Iowa's soldier, statesman and reformer, purchased by the city and dedicated to his memory as a park. James G. Weaver and Bryan were lifelong friends. Bryan followed Mr. Weaver in his Populist campaigns and later Weaver was Bryan's right hand man in the first 18 to 1 campaign.

All through their public life Weaver cut the way to new reforms and before his death, he had started the nation wide prohibition movement as a political issue. Thousands of former friends of the dead statesman, many old soldiers who followed him in war and still other thousands of people anxious to hear Bryan are here today.

"U" PLAYGROUND FOR THE WOMEN

HARRIET W. THOMPSON, DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION, U. OF O., SPEAKS BEFORE TEACHERS

OAKLAND, Aug. 18.—"The present period is highly transitional for women and finds the majority unprepared to either grasp the situation or to handle themselves efficiently under the changing conditions," said Miss Harriet W. Thompson, in speaking today before the N. E. A., in session here.

"Individualism and lack of co-operation are ascribed as the causes. Hence endeavor must be made to counteract the one and develop the other. Study of history, literature, personal experience and physical development throws light upon the subject and suggests a method of procedure.

"From infancy, women have always been unnaturally restricted, physically and mentally, and reach maturity less capable than men. Men have not grown up under like conditions, and have developed qualities which enable them to achieve greater progress than women. Therefore, since both are governed by the same laws of growth, the condition under which men have developed must contain elements needed for women's progress.

"That men are free to play from boyhood to old age, unrestricted by tight clothes and convention, and do so, and that women are not so blessed will account for most of her individualism and lack of co-operation.

"The University of Oregon, significant of this and having to provide for recently enfranchised womanhood, has provided a playground for women. Since its operation depends largely upon the weather conditions, its activities are divided into indoor and outdoor courses, the former emphasizing the development of individual skill and the latter the spirit of play and democracy. In complete operation but two years, it has already resulted in better general health and in a wider acquaintance among the girls."
