### WHAT WE EXPECT

FOR the past several weeks many demonstrations of lack of provision for the future have been found at the weekly council meetings, as the latest, when it was discovered no money had been allowed for constructive work. Improvement or upkeep of our city streets. These are the things we expect the council to provide for us.

If we are to have an economical administration, we must have a business administration, and it is only good business that an eye be kept on the future. Klamath Falls is located in a wonderful country, with surroundings that warrant a city many times the size of the present one, and to get it we must provide for it in every way possible.

An eye on the future should be kept by our city officials, planning for the things that are to count in building up our city.

### MILITARY TRAINING

SP EAKING to the topic, "Should There Be Military Training in Our Public Schools?" Louis P. Lochner, secretary of the Chicago Peace Society, today before the general session of the N. E. A. at Oakland, opposed such training as fundamentally opposed to the ideas of democracy, which it is the duty of the public schools to foster, and as particularly inadvisable at a time when the old world is looking to the new for a new basis of international relations. The great war abroad is being fought as "a war to end war." Allies and Teutons alike are proclaiming their desire to make this a war that shall liberate Europe from militarism.

It is because they believe that the allies are more in accord with the American ideal of democracy that the people of the United States are, broadly speaking, more sympathetic to the allies than to the Germans. But if this be the case, would not the introduction of military service in our public schools be a proof that, after all, we are animated by the Prussian ideal rather than the ideal of democracy. It is at best a poor way of crushing militarism elsewhere to build up American militarism in its place. Besides, no nation lives unto itself in modern times. Our confession that we have been conquered by the military ideal, and our conversion of the schools into an armory, would of necessity set in motion a wave of reaction throughout the world that would be almost as calamitous as the great war itself.

## NEW MASTER ON RICHEST ESTATE

ROCKEFELLER DOES NOT PLAY GOLF AS IN FORMER YEARS, AND MISSES MATE, WHO DIED IN FEBRUARY

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 19.—There's a changed master at Forest Hill, the big estate of the world's richest man.

That's what John D. Rockefeller's closest friends are saying, after visits to the oil king's estate. The old attendants know what has caused the change, they say. It is because their mistress is gone. For the first time, Rockefeller tramps and drives about his estate without the companionship of his wife, who died last February.

Most every morning, about 9 o'clock, Rockefeller walks slowly down from the big house to the lily pond at the foot of the long north slope. He stands there for a moment watching the waters, then turns sadly away.

In the past years, Rockefeller and his wife used to stroll to the pond, arm in arm, every morning after breakfast, which was served promptly at 7 o'clock. Attendants tell, too, how the changed master broke down and cried at his first breakfast at Forest Hill when he saw the empty chair.

Rockefeller formerly played golf with a keen delight almost every day. He seldom plays now and when he does, the old-time swing is not there. "Under every tree near my house here I see a memory picture of children playing and merry family groups," the oil king tells visitors. "I am the happiest here."

## Investigate Primitive Nebraskan

LINCOLN, Aug. 19.—Scientists from Harvard university are investigating ruins of the homes of a primitive people who lived in Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa and Missouri, along the Mississippi river before the advent of the red man to the middle western plains. The Harvard party, under Dr. Fred H. Stearns, has recently been working in the vicinity of Nebraska City and the village of Rock Bluffs.

According to the scientists this primitive people were more advanced and also more peace loving than the Indians who over-ran the country later. These ruins, in some spots are said to be in good state of preservation owing to the fact that they have for centuries been covered with earth like the ruins of Pompeii.

In some instances the charcoal and ashes of fires have been found in what remained of fireplaces, together with the fragmentary remains of the crude cooking utensils.

Near Rock Bluffs traces of what appears to have been a populous village have been uncovered, much of the remains being under fifteen feet of earth.
