GEORGIA'S DIRTY PAGE

THE recent hanging of Leo Frank by a mob and the leaving of the body for a crowd estimated at 5,000 people to view, only being rescued from further mutilation by the daring of one man, who took it and raced for protection to a city, pursued by 300 other machines, is one of the blackest and most outrageous crimes that could happen within the confines of the United States. It was an example of mob rule without restraint.

The more recent controversy between John M. Sisson, ex-governor of Georgia, who declares for the punishment of the murderers, and Mayor Woodward of Atlanta, both in San Francisco, who declares the people of Georgia have risen up in their wrath and voted out the justice the courts refused, upholding the facts, admitting that he received tons of letters asking for aid from Georgia people for Frank, would be amusing if the grim spectacle left hanging on the tree were not in the background.

It is very evident that a doubt existed in the minds of officials who investigated the murder of Mary Phagan. When members of the supreme court of that state considered the evidence doubtful, and when the ex-governor changed Frank's sentence to life imprisonment, saving him from the gallows. The evidence was all circumstantial at his trial, and based on the statements of a negro, who many believe was himself guilty of the crime.

The criminal negligence of the officers of the state penitentiary farm where Frank had already suffered an attack which nearly cost him his life, should be punished, as well as the abductors and murderers themselves. There must be something radically wrong with our system, when we provide prisons and farms for the keeping of criminals separated from the public, and then they are conducted in such a manner that those outside the walls are permitted to enter and perpetrate more horrible and ghastly crimes than the inmates ever dared.

It is evident that there is something back of the hanging of Leo Frank that has not been brought to light, and unless the Georgia officials probe it to the bottom and punish the guilty that state will have a black eye that will never die.

The newspapers are receiving statements from the leader of the mob in which he states Frank declared his innocence to the last, and if the proper officials of Georgia cannot find the guilty, it is only more evidence that Georgia's political government is not attempting to clear up the crime.
