

HARBORS MEN SEE PROJECTS

TAKEN OUT FROM PORTLAND ON
INSPECTION TRIPS TO JETTY
AT ASTORIA AND TO OTHER
POINTS OF INTEREST

PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—The jetty work being done at the mouth of the Columbia River below Astoria was inspected by the congressional rivers and harbor committee this afternoon. The committee left Portland shortly before 9 o'clock this morning. After going over the governmental work on the river bar, some of the members of the committee will go to Hoquiam on the torpedo boat Fox, while others will return to Portland.

The members of the committee were taken to the Collio canal, near The Dalles, where the \$4,000,000 work just completed by the government was inspected. Following the inspection the committee returned to Portland, where a conference was held with local business men.

What the War Moves Mean

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—A curious coincidence with regard to the Balkan situation is manifested in Germany in that they seem to possess information that is not generally known. Berlin is obviously obtaining the greatest comfort from the details in its possession.

Bulgaria's attitude is the principal cause for the German satisfaction. Despite the statements of the Bulgarian premier in his interview with Henry Wood of the United Press, Germany is almost jocularly optimistic. Apparently Germany has some assurance from Czar Ferdinand.

The Bulgarian czar is as thoroughly German as the Kaiser. He is a prince of the Saxe Coburg Gotha house, and did not become the ruler of Bulgaria until he was 36 years old. His early training was under Teutonic auspices, and his viewpoint is exceedingly German. It is questionable whether Germany's assurance that the Balkan situation will continue favorable are justified. Even though Czar Ferdinand is willing to go to any lengths to keep his country benevolently neutral, the Bulgars themselves have no divided loyalty. It would be difficult to over-ride them, but the feat is possible.

The Bulgars are smarting under the territorial losses suffered as a result of the Balkan wars, and care more for the recovery of this territory than for Ferdinand.

London, Aug. 20.—The British steamer Dunlop of Liverpool for Boston is reported submerged near where the Arabic went down. It is presumed the same submarine sank the ship.

Oakland, Aug. 20.—Dr. David Johnson of South Carolina was elected president of N. E. A. this afternoon by 479 votes to 184 for Miss Strachan.

London, Aug. 20.—The Wilson liners Grodno and Serbino and British steamer Thornfield have been submerged. The crew were rescued.

Paris, Aug. 20.—It is announced that the French have captured the cross roads near Notre Dame Delorette. Most important advance in weeks.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 20.—Carraway curtly acknowledged receipt of the Pan American appeal message from his agency. His agency hinted that this would be the last heard from him.

Berlin, Aug. 20.—The Germans are threatening Riga, Drinsk and have half encircled Brest Litovsk. The press predicts that Novo Georgiewsk will surrender in a few days with a garrison of 50,000 men.

Berlin, Aug. 20 (by wireless).—It is announced that the British cruiser Destroyer has been torpedoed and sunk, indicating that a big naval battle was fought off Jutland Tuesday.

THE CITY DUMP IS BURNING UP

STREET SUPERINTENDENT AND
FORCE OF MEN WORKING FOR
TWO DAYS IN ATTEMPT TO

NINE THOUSAND SECURED TO
PUT IN CRATER LAKE BY WAR-
DEN STOUT AND FRANK ANKEN-

Deputy State Game Warden Henry Stout and Frank Ankeny have secured 9,000 crawfish in the Sprague and other rivers of this county, for the purpose of placing them in Crater Lake for the trout.

It has been found that the fish

there are having trouble in securing food enough to live, due to the absence of tributary streams, and as a result the crawfish are to be placed there to furnish them food. They were caught by seining, and will be transported to the lake.

Nine thousand fingerlings from Lake Tahoe in California have also been secured to place in Crater Lake to replenish the fish there. They are now being held at Trail, awaiting transportation.

Bell Suffers High Rates

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 20.—Because they believe that railroads in the Southwestern states are demanding excessive rates for transportation of the Liberty Bell for part of its homeward journey, members of the committee of the councils having the trip in charge will meet next Monday prepared to revise the itinerary which had been tentatively agreed upon.

Although the return journey is 1,400 miles shorter than the northern route taken on the outward trip, the transportation charges are much higher, and it is declared that several of the proposed side trips may be abandoned. For instance, it is pointed out by members of the committee that the rate of \$8 a mile is demanded for the 35 miles between Mariopa and Phoenix, Ariz., while the rate for the 148 miles between Cleveland, O., and Pittsburgh, Pa., is only a fraction over \$3.28 a mile.

Big Mill for Bend

BEND, Ore., Aug. 20.—The Brooks Scanlon Lumber company of Minneapolis will commence construction within six weeks on a sawmill to be situated in Bend, and to have an annual sawing capacity of 50,000,000 feet. The site of the new mill will be opposite the Shevlin Hixon mill on

the east side of the Deschutes River. The new mill will employ about 60 men, and will draw from timber amounting to 23,000 acres, situated within a few miles of Bend. The location of the Brook-Scanlon company follows closely upon the commencement of work by the Shevlin-Hixon interests, whose mill is now being erected.
