END OF THE WAR?

THE allies are meeting a most stubborn resistance on the Bosporus. Still we suspect that the feeling in England is that Constantinople must be taken, no matter what the cost may be, for until it is neither Egypt, the Suez canal nor India is safe.
Egypt is filled with Mohammedans. In India there are seventy millions of them; it is clear that if the war continues until all these forces are combined and shall have learned their power, nothing in southern Asia or northern Africa will be safe against them. And Germany has stretched a railroad from the Mediterranean as far into Asia as ancient Mesopotamia and should a peace be patched up before Constantinople is taken and a way made for Russian ships out from the Black sea, the situation will be a constant menace to both Great Britain and Russia. This is so manifest that it is not impossible that the next great drive of the Germans may be to secure a hold on the Balkan states and to try to raise the siege on the Bosporus. As the war develops, the difficulty of estimating when it will close, grows greater and greater. Unless a pestilence comes, or the people in desperation rise up and demand peace, it is clear that there will be no cessation until "the heavy boots, now rolling on the ice, shall be mauling cold and low."

When Greatest Boxers of World Meet



PACKY MCFARLAND

Packy McFarland, the fastest and greatest boxer the world has known, with the exception of the ancient "Young Griffe" and Jim Driscoll, respectively Australian and Welsh wonder, will meet Mike Gibbons, the best fighting middleweight in the world, and also one of the greatest boxers the ring has known, September 11, at the Brighton Beach Motordrome at Coney Island. William C. Marshall, who never managed a boxing match, has contracted to give them the heretofore unheard of purse of \$22,500—that is, unheard of for a no-decision, ten round contest.

Three weeks ago Marshall would have called the man crazy who suggested that he promote a prize fight. It all came about during a conversation with a sporting writer. Their conversation drifted to the possibility of McFarland and Gibbons ever coming together. Could it be done? The sporting writer was sure it could. Marshall glanced toward the big motor-

drom, with a possible seating capacity of 60,000, and the thought flashed through his mind. Within four days he and the sporting writer were on

their way to Chicago, and within twenty-four hours they were in communication with the two great boxers. The two men got together, and both men insisted on more money than Marshall had decided to pay. It was a matter of \$7,000 difference. The fight stood deadlocked. Marshall suddenly brushed away every obstacle by saying "You're on!"

There are many interesting facts in the life of William C. Marshall, and not the least of these is the fact that he never witnessed a boxing match. He started the McFarland-Gibbons bout as a business venture pure and simple, and it was only the atmosphere of the thing that made of him the enthusiastic fight fan that he is today.

He has handled some large contracts for the Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Soo, C. P. R. and Milwaukee railroads. After finishing on the C. P. R. in the early spring he went on to New York to visit his cousin, Chauncey Marshall Jr. of Brighton Bath.

What the War Moves Mean

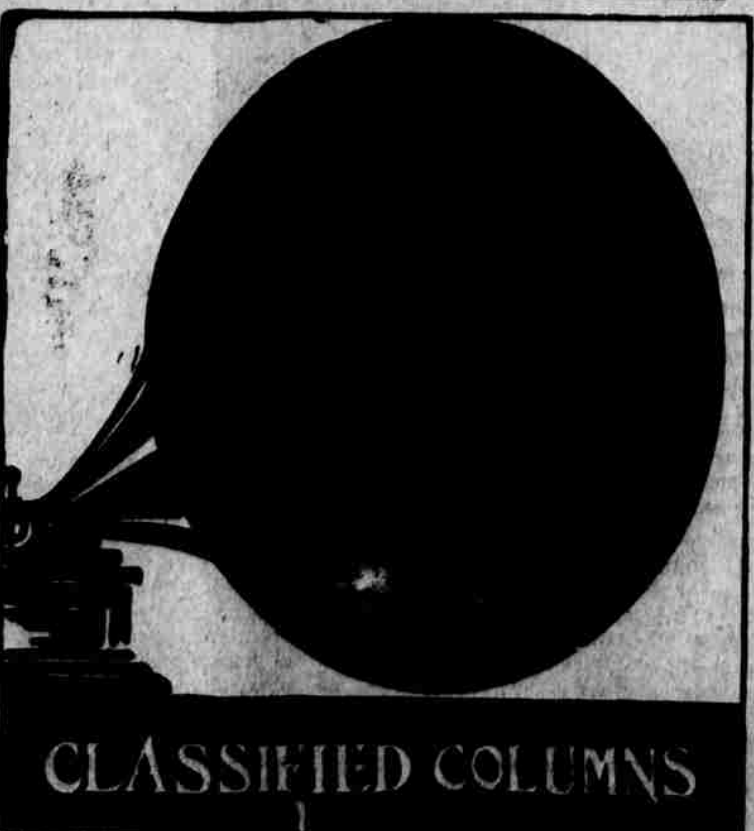
NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—The capture of Novo Georgiewsk by the Germans has no military importance. It was useless to the Russians after the evacuation of their Vistula line. Probably the only reason the garrison did not retreat from the Vistula with the main Russian forces was because the Teutons blocked their retirement.

Petrograd's announcement after Warsaw was evacuated that Novo Georgiewsk was being retained as long as possible in order to delay the Germans has no basis in fact. Novo Georgiewsk commands the single railway line from East Prussia to Warsaw. It is not a railway fortress, like Manteuffel. By sacrificing about 40,000 men, who eventually surrendered, the French retained Manteuffel long enough to prevent the Germans from receiving seriously needed supplies. There was no similar reason for holding Novo Georgiewsk.

Whatever was the strength of the defenders of the fortress, Russia lost gratuitously just that number of trained men. It is the first sign of Russian recklessness.
