AMERICA'S PROBLEM

"WITH THE civilized world engaged in a life and death struggle for commercial supremacy, this nation is confronted with the most stupendous problem in its history.

"Our social and industrial fabric is rent asunder by the forces of materialism as they grapple with man's inherent demand for standards of beauty and spiritual ideals.

"Art is a quality or state of mind in which harmony is the result of laws obeyed. Beauty is this art quality externalized in material objects. Its presence is spontaneous and must be conceived before it can be expressed.

"We must, in the near future, not only supply ourselves with the textiles, furniture, carpets, wall papers, clothes and other necessities furnished by Europe; but we shall in many instances be asked to supply South America and Europe itself.

"In matters of material resources, mechanical skill and physical energy, we are ready. In matters of art, we are crude, uncertain and worst of all, unsatisfied. Until there is a changed attitude, we can not compete; for the art quality is as essential to man's perfect satisfaction as any material quality can be.

"It is the business of education to adjust people to the needs and conditions in which they find themselves. The function of art education now is to meet successfully this impending issue.

"The solution of this problem lies first in understanding and acknowledging that these conditions exist; second, in awakening to a true knowledge of what art is and to its function in the industrial fields of life; and, third, to cancel dead traditions in methods of art instruction and make it live founded on the everlasting principles of beauty, which is in harmony in all things."—From an address on "Art in Its Relation to Industrial Life," by Frank A. Parsons, president of the New York School of Fine and Applied Art.

ENGLAND AWARE OF HER FAILINGS

LONDON, Aug. 11.—(By mail)—England knows France is not satisfied with her.
The showing Great Britain has made

with her land forces has not been all that France has had a right to expect. While the dispatch from William Philip Simms, the United Press correspondent in Paris, probably reveals to America for the first time the extent of the French discontent, it relates facts which are well known to Britishers.

Britishers admit, with sincere regret, that France has had some ground for her complaints. But they predict that in the very near future the allies will have no basis for criticism.

Britishers do not deny the French charge contained in Simms' article that the Britons are fortifying London with a double row of defense. The Britishers are looking square in the face the remote possibility that the British Isles may be invaded by Germany. London has been preparing for invasion for a long time. Great Britain will do her best to keep the possible invaders away from Calais, and the French criticism that the British are thoughtlessly worrying more about London than they are about Calais is not well received in London. Calais may be on French soil, but the British realize that it is the German gateway to London, and that it must be defended to England's utmost. However, if the British fall at Calais, they must be prepared to make their last stand at London.

It is true, as the French point out, that strikes have hampered the British, but that defect is being remedied, thanks to the efficient work and inspiring appeals of the new minister of munitions, Lloyd George. Twenty-six new national arsenals have been started within the past month, and 100,000 British workmen have offered their services in this connection.

Now that they know the truth of the empire's grave peril, the workmen of England have decided to quit striking.

The Englishman quoted by Simms, as saying that the army of 3,000,000 men in England were supplied with wooden guns, was exaggerating conditions. For the most part the men in training have rifles. It is true that thousands may be seen daily in the parks of London drilling with wooden guns, but these men are Home Defense Guards, men who are unable due to physical or other disqualification, to enlist in the regular service, and even they will shortly be supplied with excellent rifles.

TAFT SPEAKS TO CHURCH PEOPLE

A Little Sporting Gossip

NEW YORK, Aug. 25.—This week will be, perhaps, the most important one of the season, baseballically speaking. A pennant winner may be made or broken in the next six days. A tail-ender, Cincinnati, for instance, can all but gain the leadership in the league, providing, of course, it wins all its games while the leaders are losing all of theirs. It's very improbable, of course, but it goes to show that the race in the National League is still anybody's old pennant the fourth week in August, the first time such a state of things has existed since Heck was a pup.

The Braves broke back into the running Saturday by taking two games from the Pirates. Stallings' crew went from fifth to third place, but four games behind the promenading Phils. This feat, besides showing how close the race is, demonstrates that the old punch which carried the Boston clan out in front last year, is not entirely gone, despite the well nigh complete capitulation of one of the best pitching staffs the game ever saw. Stallings picked up a new twirler, a Mr. Hohf, formerly of Rose poly College, Saturday, and the youngster went through with flying colors. Rudolph also won. All Boston needs, ball players say, is a little decent pitching to place them in the running until the curtain falls. It is a significant fact that practically all the players believe the race will ultimately simmer down and the Braves battling for the pennant.

On straight form, Brooklyn generally is considered the most evenly balanced aggregation in the league. Wilbert Robinson's well known penchant for young pitchers has had its good result, and Colonel Ebbetts now has one of the best staffs, if not the best in the Toner loop. Added to the tremendous hitting strength of the Dodgers, this makes the Brooklyn outfit a formidable foe.

Eastern betting men have practically quit—thrown up their hands in despair. A swing around the sporting hangouts today failed to reveal a single bookmaker willing to place his money on any one team at odds that would make it worth while to the ordinary chance taker. "I've closed my book," was the invariable answer. "I'd just about as soon bet you that the sun wouldn't rise tomorrow as to place a bet on any one team in the National League," said one, and his companions echoed his sentiments.

Joe Jackson's purchase by the White Sox is going to have a heavy bearing on the American League race, unless all signs fail. Chicago and Detroit both have strengthened their teams this week—Chicago by taking Jackson, and the Tigers by acquiring Bill Jams, late of the Browns, and an A-1 pitcher. The Boston team was a 6-to-5 favorite to win until Chicago and Detroit both picked up stars, but betting men today were dubious, if not flatly refusing, to accept the wagers. There is a lot of indignation in some cities of San Johnson's circuit, over the tactics of Comiskey, Lannin and Navin. The charge had been openly made by sport writers and fans that the magnates in Chicago, Boston and Detroit are trying to "buy" a pennant. Comiskey has spent approximately \$1,000,000 on his club this year, exclusive of salaries and the players he traded in. He paid \$50,000 for Eddie Collins, \$15,000 for Eddie Murphy, \$30,000 for Joe Jackson, and \$1,500 for Mose Leibold, besides several more thousands for minor leaguers.
