

Fire Fighter Impresses "Cub" on Forest Service

NEW APPIAN WAY IS VIEWED HURRIEDLY, AND IS PRONOUNCED A WONDER—COUNTY SHOULD BE PROUD OF IT, AND NOT MISS SEEING IT—FIRE FIGHTERS HAVE TROUBLES OF THEIR OWN IN PROTECTING KLAMATH COUNTY FROM GREAT LOSS

When the ordinary layman sees Jack Kimball passing through town in "Old Betsy," with his big and genial smile, perhaps he thinks how nice and convenient it is to be responsible for between 20,000,000,000 and 30,000,000,000 feet of standing timber in Southern Oregon and Northern California. Jack always looks good in his khaki and leggings, and with a sunburned countenance that is pleasant to look on by the lover of nature, he must live an ideal life.

Yesterday he dropped into the city about 3:30 after driving eighty miles during the day, watching eleven different fires started in the timber by the recent electrical storm, and politely asked the writer if he wanted to take a ride. There was a small fire that could be seen from the Ft. Klamath road and White Pelican hotel, and appeared to be a tree burning on the top of one of the small hills east and north of the city. How long will it be? Just an hour, come on, and so I went.

We decided to take the new road to

Fort Klamath and the Wood River Valley, as the fire appeared to be near that road, and struck out. It was the first time either had been over the new road, and to say that it is a highway any county might be proud of is putting it mildly. Although slightly rough in spots now, and in need of a little work along the edges to put it into true highway style, it is a road that in years to come will mean much to this county, and will be one of the scenic drives of the state. The preponderance and immensity of it is wonderful. While the "fire patrol" special did not follow the road around Rattlesnake Point, the rise of the road as it goes around the point could be plainly seen as the machine rounded the beautiful curves on the road, and the view that can be gained from the rest at this point must be wonderful.

The return in the evening, with the sky overcast, the air filled to a blue haze with smoke from a number of small fires in the 35,000,000,000 feet of timber surrounding the lake, and a broad streak of dull red growing duller and duller over the mountain ridges back of Pelican Bay Mountain, Mt. McLaughlin and Aspen Lake Mountain, resembling in the distance a mighty roaring forest fire that was sending forth nothing but red fire, was a sight never to be forgotten.

But this was a narrative on "first aid" to a forest fire. Jack invited the writer to accompany him on an hour's run to settle the little blaze in the timber off by itself. Not knowing exactly whether it was an invitation out of interest or a polite way of enforcing one to make the trip under an emergency clause supplied fire fighters, the invitation was accepted.

The first thing noticed was "Old Betsy" and her ability to climb hills. Jack says she takes the rock crusher hill west of town on the high right along, and we believe him. Her motor was once a 40-horsepower Buick, and that is enough for anybody that knows automobiles. She has been put in another frame by Jack, with 700 pound shock absorbers for emergencies. And you ought to see him travel. Fifty miles an hour is easy on a good road, but Klamath roads are not built for that speed, he says. Anyway, he made close to thirty-five coming down the hill into the city on the return, and though rough, one hardly left the seat, and the bumps soon passed by. "Due to the shock absorbers," said Jack. They cost him \$40, besides the putting of them on, but in his business he could not get along without them.

So far this season, since April, when he made the trip to Lakeview, he has traveled 7,700 miles in "Old Betsy." In turning off the main highway we used an old logging road, and they were not built for automobiles, even those built along "Betsy's" lines, high off the ground, and sturdy. It had been raining for some time, and the road was slippery. Dodging stumps, rocks and high ridges in the center of the road was no joke. It was an art. Jack was asked if he had much of this travel and he said "all the time," between stumps. And we believe him, for the way he did it was good to watch, though once or twice we were afraid of "Betsy's" ability at climbing trees. But he did.

We finally pulled out up under a tree and sought some shelter from the rain when we noticed that Tommy—that's the dog that occupies the basket on the side running board, and how he manages to keep his place on such trips is just a little more than I would surmise to say. "I lost Tommy the other day," said Jack, "and did not notice that he was gone for some time. I was coming to town, and hitting a good pace, and did not know whether I was going to have much dog left or not. But just as I was turning around to go back for him, here he came over the hill, more than logging it."

Although the rain looked favorable for putting out forest fires, the hill was steep—as near straight up with out falling over into the valley as possible, and possible a quarter of a mile high—not long, Jack decided to go up and see how the land lay, to prevent another visit later, should it get more or a start. We started up, and up we went for one solid hour. The nearer we got to the fire the farther away it seemed, though from the city limits it looked but a short trip. Although his hair is gray, and he claims to be on the declining side of

FRANK WRITES BEFORE DEATH

WAS SURE HE WOULD BE VINDICATED OF CHARGE AND RELEASED FROM CONFINEMENT EVENTUALLY

OAKLAND, Aug. 25.—A letter from Leo M. Frank, written two days before he was taken from the state prison farm at Milledgeville, Ga., and lynched by a mob, was received here today by Benjamin F. Wulff, an attorney, and a life-long friend of Frank.

The letter, which was sent from the prison farm and dated August 14th, said:

"My Dear Friend—Just a few words: of appreciation for your letter of July 28th. I am very thankful to an all-wise God that I am able to write to you after having been so near death. Surely I must have been spared to see the day when that honor, which is justly mine, shall be meted out to me. The wound in my neck will be entirely healed within a few days. I am still weak from initial loss of blood, and am confined to bed. With every good wish, in which Mrs. Frank joins, I am, sincerely yours, (Signed) 'LEO M. FRANK.'"

London—The Hull Trawler under Commander Doyle, has been submerged, three of the crew being drowned and nine saved.

Boston—The governors attending the conference agree that the moment is fortunate, as most believe America's preparedness will be threshed out immediately, so far as the states are concerned.

Washington—Carranza's reply is believed to be en route. It will probably be a recognition of the Latin-American demand made.

Marietta—The coroner's jury returned a verdict that Leo Frank was killed by persons unknown.

Washington—Colonel P. M. Perkins, recently recommissioned in the Marines Special Act by Congress, has been ordered in command of the barracks at Puget Sound. He retired in 1907, afterwards sought reinstatement, charging that he was forced to quit by his superiors. He has been known as the "American Dreyfus."

FRANK'S SLAYERS SAID TO BE KNOWN

ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 25.—It was intimated by the officials that the identity of a member of the so-called vigilance committee that lynched Leo M. Frank was known to some officials, and that the information probably would be placed before Governor Harris next week.

Judge J. H. Patterson of the superior court has let it be known that he would prepare a special charge to the grand jury, which will meet in September. Herbert Clay, Cobb county solicitor, assured the governor he would do all in his power to find and bring to trial the men responsible for the lynching.
